Governor Daugaard offers sales tax increase to boost teacher pay

Community News Service Declaring that "this is the year to get out of last place," Gov. Dennis Daugaard said he would seek a onehalf-cent increase in the state sales tax to raise teacher pay in South Dakota.

Citing the work of the Blue Ribbon Task-Force on Teachers and Students, Daugaard said that low teacher pay in South Dakota was causing school districts to come up short when they tried to recruit

teachers. During his State of the State speech on Tuesday, Daugaard said that rural school districts in South Dakota have "trouble getting any applicants at all."

Daugaard said South Dakota's average annual teacher pay is \$8,000 behind North Dakota. With South Dakota teacher pay lagging behind all of its neighbors, young teachers are choosing to begin their careers elsewhere, he said

Sixty yards of concrete, six truck loads worth, showed up at the Willow Lake School construction site on Thursday of last week. Wayne Tellinghuisen and his crew worked fast as each load was brought in via two Power Buggy cement carts loaded up from the truck at the back of

the building. The concrete screed machine vibrated and flattened the concrete rolling along its wood frame in the process making the base for the gymnasium floor.

Concrete was poured for the Willow Lake gym floor

Willow Lake School construction is moving along right on schedule according to superintendent Scott Klaudt.

"We're two thirds done with the exterior and 39 percent complete of the whole project," stated Klaudt. "Right now construction crews are

working on the entrance between the two gyms and today (last Thursday) concrete is being poured for the base of the gymnasium.

'The nice weather has been great for the Tellinghuisen construction crew to keep them on schedule."

Plans are for the gymnasium to

be usable for classrooms by next fall.

Sixty yards of concrete with trucks carrying 10 yards at a time, poured half of the gym floor base last Thursday. Two trucks from GCC concrete out of Huron went back and forth all day and plans

The whole project is projected to be done including all classrooms and the new library in the spring of 2017.
