Leaving a legacy

Dr. Glenn E. Ullyot remembered his roots

Glenn E. Ullyot graduated from Clark High School in 1927. While in high school he studied chemistry under the tutelage of chemistry teacher Florence Winnings.

Ullyot credited Miss Winnings many times during his professional accomplishments, ranking only behind his family.

The life story of Glenn Ullyot is a remarkable story. Many have left Clark County and been very successful, but Dr. Ullyot felt strong enough about 'where he came from' that he gave back generously after accumulating great wealth.


What separates Glenn Ullyot from many successful Clark County natives is that he gave back.

"Glenn Ullyot has been very generous in his support of education, the advancement and understanding of science and his support of Clark," said his nephew Dan at the dedication ceremony of the new Clark City Hall on June 19,1999.

Dr. Glenn E. Ullyot was the donor of \$600,000 (+) to the city of Clark enabling them to build a new city hall, after reading about the city's plight in the local newspaper, that he subscribed to while living in Annapolis, MD.

Ullyot dedicated the building which is and always will, be known as 'The Ullyot Building' in Clark to his parents and brothers in appreci-

The 89-year-old Ullyot had this to say on the day of the dedication. "I am grateful for the opportunity and the capability to make a meaningful contribution to the community of Clark. Many people had faith in me and helped me along the way. The Bockoven brothers, for whom I



School Board approves \$3,900,000 building project llow Lake

The big news coming out of the January 14 meeting of Willow Lake School Board of Education meeting was the approval of the building

Three community meetings have been held regarding this building project, on Dec. 1, Dec. 17 and Jan.

What is being proposed is the replacing of the old school area with three classrooms, renovating the administration area of the elementary wing and erecting a 13,762 square foot gym to be added south of the auditorium. The gym was to be located east of the current auditorium, but now will be built to the south.

Lead architect Dean Marske of Aberdeen attended last Wednesday's meeting After he explained why he thought the gym should be south of the auditorium he then spoke of the upcoming bidding pro-

The Willow Lake School Board, consisting of president Caryl Schmidt, Aaron Wicks, Julayne Thoreson, Cory Bratland and Paula Warkenthien asked Marske several questions, relating to options and add-ons relating to finances and re-

lated to the process. After roughly a 20-minute question and answer forum, the board voted to go ahead with the building project, not to exceed \$3,900,000. (To see the exact motion, go to Ac-

tion Item #10 in the Willow Lake School Board minutes.) Voting in favor of this proposed

building project were Schmidt, Bratland, Wicks and Thoreson. Voting nay was Warkenthien.

Willow Lake superintendent Scott Klaudt said that this will be a new experience for the board. As far as the building timeline, the finalized drawing process will start

immediately. It is the board's goal to not go over \$3,900,000 and Marske talked of various cost options. It was mentioned that a 42' x 42' wrestling room, in combination with the Wellness Center could be looked at as an option. Currently the gym could seat 583 people, but this also could

In other business: ▲ The terms of Cory Bratland and Aaron Wicks expire this year. If an election is needed it would be held the third Tuesday in June.

▲ The length of the school day was discussed, but no changes were made at this time. As were possible snow make-up days, discussed and tabled to February.

▲ In 2015-16, volleyball and basketball games will probably begin at 6:00 p.m. rather than 6:30 p.m.

▲ The next Willow Lake board meeting will be Monday, Feb. 9 in the business office.
