Petitions may be circulated beginning this Friday, Jan. 26 and need to be filed by 5:00 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 23, 2018.

Clark: Three council positions will become vacant in Clark due to the expiration of the present terms of office. In Ward I, there is one three-year term open, currently held by Brian Cook. Ward II council with incumbent being Louann Streff has a three-year term available and Ward III with Andrew Zemlicka being the incumbent, also has a three-year term. The finance officer in Clark is Jackie Luttrell.

Willow Lake: Three positions will become vacant in Willow Lake. The present terms of office for council members that will expire are: Ward I - a two-year term held by Matt Kadinger and in Ward II - a two-year term currently held by Duane Seefeldt. The two-year term of mayor currently held by Delwin Bratland will also become vacant. Heidi Madsen is the Willow Lake city finance officer.

Henry School: Henry School

The municipal elections this District #14-2 holds their election the same time as city elections. Two three-year terms are open with the incumbents being Neil Jensen and David Fuller. Gail Thompson is the business manager at Henry School.

Garden City: One council position will become vacant due to the expiration of the present term. One three-year term currently held by Joyce Hansen is open. Jeanette Warkenthien is the finance officer for Garden

Bradley: Two three-year term positions presently held by Rebecca Caulfield and Royal Rosheim will become vacant due to the expiration of the present terms. The finance officer for Bradley is Jeanette Warkenthien.

Vienna: One three-year term position currently held by Lue Regnier will become vacant due to the expiration of the present term. The finance officer for Vienna is Nancy Roberts.

Naples: One three-year term trustee position currently held by Lee Redinger will become vacant due to the expiration of the present term. The finance officer for Naples is Betty Holida.

After nearly a century of service, **Helping Hand Club disbands**

Eighty years after the quilt was made by the active club, whose members' goal was to help other people, the club members have decided to disband.

Down to four members in recent years-Eleanor Mehlberg, Mary Lou Mehlberg, JoAnn Reis and Marlene Hink-the decision was made at the November meeting that this one would be their last.

"When I first started, there were so many in the club, we would have two or three hostesses to serve at our meetings," recalled Mary Lou Mehlberg, who has been the club secretary since 2002. When she joined, it was noted in the club minutes that five-year-old Austin Reis (her grandson) joined with her.

"We always brought our kids," added Eleanor Mehlberg, who served for many years as president of the club. "Everyone would bring their kids or grandkids back then.
