January weather has been tolerable

Days seem to pass quicker in January when the weather is unseasonably warmer. Notice the weather for last week, shown above. The highs have averaged in the mid-30°'s and the low in the mid-20°'s. The average temperature for this part of January is normally below 20°

It gets even better. The January Thaw will be working in full force through Wednesday (today), melting much of the remaining snow and boosting the average temperature for the month further above normal.

A cold front is forecast to move across the area Wednesday afternoon and evening, bringing an end to the very mild conditions as the month of January 2015 draws to a close. Thursday and Friday will be cooler, but still above normal for late January. Saturday looks rather cold, with highs mainly in the 20°'s.

Dave Woodring invents and patents a frost free sewer vent cover



Dave, Robin, Garrett and Carly Woodring of Raymond, along with Aaron Helkenn of Clark have been manufacturing and distributing Dave's patented invention since this past summer.

Owner of Woodring Plumbing, seeing a solution was needed for a frost free sewer vent cover, Dave came up with a design for one which has been a

Many late nights lying awake, thinking of a solution was the beginning of the invention that will help all northern region homes prevent the problem of frozen up, clogged sewer vents on rooftops in the wintertime.

It's called the Frost Free Sewer Vent Cover and it is patented by its inventor, Dave Woodring of

Woodring Plumbing in Clark, with manufacturing done at his home near Raymond.

"In my line of work, everyone had the same issue, all of the time in the winter - frozen sewer vents. I thought to myself, there has got to be a solution for this," said Wo-

Dave's wife Robin recalls when

success. Patented and currently in production on the Woodring farm by Raymond, the vent covers are an answer to the frozen and ice clogged sewer vent problem. While the men work on the production side of things, Carly and Robin are working with the internet sales and the promotional side of the business on their days off from work.

> younger, having to climb up on the roof with a pitcher of hot water to pour down into the vent on their older farmhouse, to melt the frozen obstruction. "Believe me, you know it when your sewer vent is clogged," states R. Woodring. "It's an awful

Woodring's new vent cover is environmentally 'green' in its design

as it uses solar power to warm up had printed in Clark and Carly and the outside to prevent a clog of ice or snow on the inside.

With a thermos type of design, having an air chamber between the layers, this thermal sleeve provides an insulated air space that allows for moisture laden air to escape from a vent stack all the way to the outside environment without cooling, condensing or forming ice. Hence no dangerous trip to the roof, which also may be covered with snow and ice to fix or melt a blocked sewer vent.

Woodring made a few prototypes five years ago and gave out about 20 of them to different homes and all

had success with no freezing issues. "Three years ago, we thought we had better patent this, so that process began," explained Dave Woodring. "We hired the Montgomery Patent Agency out of Canonsburg, Penn. and they ran us through the process. There are a lot of hoops to jump through. They helped to keep it simple for us. After the patent now we've hired the marketing firm through the same company. They are presenting the patent to different corporations and so far there has been a lot of interest. They're looking to find a company to either buy the patent or produce it big time. Meanwhile, we're making them and selling them right now. We're the only source that is making them so far.

"We've been making about 500 a week out here on the farm. We'd like to keep about 1,000 of them ready to go to be prepared."

It's a family business with Dave, his wife Robin, their son Garrett and his wife Carly Woodring doing the work along with Aaron Helkenn who works with Dave in his plumb-

"Carly designed the brochure we

I will be doing some farm shows and trade shows upcoming. Carly also works with our internet sales which have been going great," said Robin

Woodring. "There is no other frost free vent on the market that is patented that we know of," added Dave.

"It's unique in that the black color absorbs heat, even on cloudy days it's been proven. You can install it yourself. It fits over your existing pipe and we can even make up a special order larger pipe if needed," continues Woodring.

"Everything we've done so far is in house. We constructed our own tables and saws in figuring out the process. We started this summer in making mass quantities on the farm. It's been a real learning curve with taxes in different states and shipping to Canada is a learning curve all its own. We want to keep everything local as much as we possibly can with our paint and supplies. Dekker Hardware carries our vent covers and we're also working with Tri-State Builders out of Sisseton, who's helping us in distribution, as is the Watertown Winnelson Co. in Watertown.

"We'd like to keep manufacturing here if at all possible. It's kind of a waiting game now. We have wholesale waiting on our production part of it - how much we can manufacture at one time.

"Everyone who has tried them has had really good success and no freezing issues. It may frost over on the outside but the inside remains open with the transfer of heat and its design. Sunlight hits the black outside and heats up the air chamber which melts the ice. This is what works. And, ends Woodring -No carbon footprint."
