S.D. businesses get creative to overcome supply chain crisis

South Dakota businesses are feeling the costly effects of the lingering global supply chain issues brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, but many business operators are finding creative ways to keep shelves stocked, to reduce the impact on customers and to continue making a profit.

Throughout 2021, a trying year on many economic fronts, virtually all industries have been affected at some level by either product shortages, raw material shortages, shipping delays and other ripple effects up and down the supply chain.

The shortage of goods and workers to handle them have created a "perfect storm" of challenges that are hitting small businesses that

make up the bulk of the South Da- modity and fuel prices and compekota economy especially hard, said Tom Martin, instructor at the Beacom School of Business at the University of South Dakota.

Some of the snags are caused by backlogs at the major shipping ports. Others stem from factory closures amid the coronavirus pandemic, and still more come from the shortage of available workforce. Workers are in short supply across the economic spectrum, including truck drivers to deliver necessary products, employees who make products, and at the retail level where shelves must be stocked, customers checked out at registers and food made and served to restaurant diners

The challenges retailers face are also compounded by rising com-

tition from large online retailers like Amazon, which are more able

City property continues unsold

City Council lasted a little over an hour followed by an executive session that lasted a little under an hour. No motions were necessary following the closed meeting.

During the public portion at City Hall, four agenda items dealt with city - owned land, and the selling of said properties.

The properties include: the corner lot at 416 2nd Ave NW, where the house had been razed within the last month; two lots by sealed bid, one on S. Kansas St., the site of the community gardens, the other on the southwest corner of S. Cloud St and 7th Ave S; and the lots east of Dollar General on US Hwy 212, in Clark.

All bids were eventually rejected unanimously by the council. Earlier in the meeting the council approved an auction for the land sale on the lot at the corner of N. Clinton St. and 2nd Ave NW. This action was

The January meeting of the Clark rescinded when all the bids were rejected. The council will determine what their best options are regarding suitable sales, whether it be by advertised auction or connection with a realty company, etc.

Golf course fees were approved for 2022. Membership fees remained the same with cart storage fees increasing. Winter clubhouse rental also increased and no rental break is now given to members.

In other business:


