It must be reiterated that these numbers are approximations in estimating the cost of construction and it is more often than not on the low side.

These are amounts estimated by property owners when taking out their permits in advance and not the assessed values of the finished

In the county of Clark, outside of city limits, D.S. Batchelor Holdings, LLC built the Powder River Precision building which was estimated at \$392,000. The manufacturer of

located east of Clark. Construction in the amount of \$1,600,000 was ongoing at the Hillcrest, Fordham and Collins Hutterite colonies.
