Ballots now available for November 6 election

Absentee voting has began for the Tuesday, Nov. 6 General Election. To vote absentee, registered voters can either vote in person at their county auditor's office, or by mail

If one wishes to vote in person at their auditor's office, one needs: a photo identification card such as a driver's license, non-driver ID, passport including a picture, tribal identification card including a picture, or student ID including a picture. If a voter does not have a photo ID, they must be given the option to sign a personal identification affidavit and vote a regular ballot.

If one wishes to vote absentee by mail one must fill out an application and have the signature notarized or provide a copy of their photo identification.

A registered voter can view their

sample ballot online, at https://sdsos.gov. Go under election resources, click on view sample ballot, type in name and birthday. Sample ballots are also available at the Clark County auditor's office and will be published in the Clark County Courier closer to the election day.

The registered voters may cast their votes for Libertarian George Hendrickson, Republican Dustin Johnson, Democrat Tim Bjorkman or Independent Ron Wieczorek for United States Representative.

In the contest for the Governor of South Dakota, citizens may vote for Libertarian Kurt Evans, Republican Kristi Noem or Democrat Billie Sutton

Alexandra Frederick, Democrat are running for South Dakota Secretary of State.

For SD Attorney General, voters may vote for either Republican Jason Ravnsborg or Democrat Randy Seiler. For State Auditor, Rich Sattgast, Republican and Tom Cool, Democrat are on the ballot.

State treasurer candidates are Republican Josh Haeder and Democrat Aaron Matson.

Republican Ryan Brunner and Democrat Woody Houser are running for Commissioner of School and Public Lands.

Public Utilities Commissioner candidates are Republican Kristie Fiegen and Democrat Wayne Frederick.

Brock Greenfield, Republican and Paul Register, Democrat are Steve Barnett, Republican and running for State Senator in District 2

Courthouse readying for new elevator

Arrangements are being made so that elevator repairs will be done later this fall at the Clark County Courthouse.

Starting on Friday, November 9, the elevator will be out of commission for approximately 50 days.

What's happening here, is a big Gray Construction crane is lifting bricks down into the hole on the fourth floor of the courthouse. These bricks will be used to cover the hole after the elevator is put into place.
