

# Cyclones place fifth at State cross country meet

The Clark-Willow Lake Cyclones placed three runners in the top 40 to place fifth as a team at the Class A State Cross Country Meet at Hart Ranch Camping Resort in Rapid City on October 26.

Sioux Falls Christian coasted to first as a team in the girls' varsity division with four runners in the top six, totaling 16 points to repeat as team champion. Lennox took second with 82 points. West Central was fourth at 87 points.

Flandreau scored 100 team points Dakota Valley at 110 points for fifth place, with Clark-Willow Lake's fourth place runner Cadence Bochek finishing higher, earning the tie breaker and a podium finish.

With three runners in the top 40 led by freshman Kamryn Nesheim, the Cyclones could sense the urgency to move up in the pack to increase their team standing. Nesheim was the first Cyclone runner to cross the finish line, earning All-State honors, finishing 22nd in 20:11.55.

According to Cyclone Head Coach Tammie Paulson, "With our goal of be-

The Class A race for both boys and girls is always a highly competitive endeavor, and the Cyclones encountered individual and team battles to fight for position. The Cyclones are no strangers to third or fourth season under Coach Paulson, and the confidence showed with their experience.

With Paulson's mix of youth and experience, the recipe was a successful one for meeting team goals and expectations. Although the newcomers to the team had some nerves, by the time the starting gun went off, it was business as usual for CWL.

"Our new runners were very nervous coming into the state meet," added Coach Paulson. "It is always good to get that first state meet behind you. I

One such rookie was junior Will Hovde. Hovde got his first taste of state level competition in the highly competitive Class A boys' race in Rapid City. As the Cyclones' lone boys' varsity qualifier, Hovde navigated the race without the assurance of five other teammates to help push and pull him along. 
