## Seven McMillan siblings gather at the site of the house fire - 50 years later

Almost 50 years after the fact seven children of Delbert and Naomi McMillan met at the farm where a fire destroyed the house they were living in, near Carpenter. The children got out of the fire with only the clothes on their backs. The reason for getting together

was, in their words - "We are still all living and decided to go back to that farm and take another picture of all of us together. We feel very blessed to be alive and to be able to take a picture at the site of the tragedy that took place so many years

The story appeared in the February 26, 1970 edition of the *Clark* County Courier reading:

Friday the 13th, 1970 will be one to remember for the Delbert McMillan family of Carpenter. That night seven children were alone at their house south of Carpenter when they were awakened by a fire that completely destroyed their home. The house was owned by Bill Fechtelkot-

The children later related that they went to bed late after enjoying an evening of television. Pat woke up about 3:30 a.m. noticing flames close to his bed. He roused his brother Larry. Their sister Jaunita gathered the younger children and Larry drove them to their grandfather's home two miles east of town. Their grandfather, Clarence McMillan, notified the Iroquois Fire Department. However, the firemen had trouble with their hoses freezing and the house burned to the ground. At the time of the fire the parents were at a wrestling tourney in Brookings where their son, Tom, took second

place in his weight class. The children pictured were Jau-

The family is presently staying with their grandfather and great aunt, Irene Kaiser. They hoped to be in a new house three miles east of

The McMillan family had 11 children total. The four who were older and not at the house that night included Shirley (McFarland), Jack, Clarence and Tommy.

## The Willow Warts School of Music continues

"It's a fun way for the students to learn about music without having to take a test," stated Willow Lake music director Jennifer Karlen of her Willow Warts School of Music and Musicians group.

Inspired by the Harry Potter books, she's come up with a fun curriculum in which the students can be in individual groups or 'houses'. They've designed a house crest, a motto and each group has drawn a composer for their house.

The four composers represent different styles of music and students in the process learn more about each composer and what they contributed.

For instance Clara Schumann is a well known female composer and pianist who was one of the first to memorize her music before performing. She was also a child prodigy in starting so young.

Wolfgang Mozart is another child prodigy who wrote an opera at 14 years old and was known for his expertise in classical music.

John Phillip Sousa was known as the father of marching band music.

George Gershwin is another American composer known for bringing jazz into the concert hall and for his Broadway musicals. Self-taught at the piano, he mixed pop, blues, jazz and classical music together.

Karlen's sixth grade through senior music students all divided up into three houses with Karlen having the fourth house. The houses all earn or lose points with behaviors and activities and can also catch their teacher and even steal her points and vice versa.

"I do the challenge right along with the students. The junior high kids have caught me a couple
