Veteran VanSickle participates in Mission 16: Midwest Honor Flight

Gordy VanSickle of Henry is a U.S. veteran who was selected by Seed for Success Midwest Honor Flight Mission 16 to attend the Honor Flight on September 16, 2023. The Honor Flight gives veterans the opportunity to fly to Washington D.C. for a day and visit many memorials that recognize veterans. His son Troy VanSickle was also able to attend the flight as his father's guardian. The Vietnam Memorial was one of Vansickle's favorite to visit.

VanSickle served three years in the United States Army, going through eight weeks of basic training, eight months of schooling, and during his final year, he taught basic electronics at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama. Also, during his time served, he was in Vietnam for exactly one year from 1968 to 1969, where he was a in signal communications. VanSickle said the thing he enjoyed most about his time in the service was "serving for my country." When asked if he had any advice for anyone considering going into the U.S. Army, he stated, "It's a great experience for every-

Gordy said that another highlight of the trip was being able to meet, shake hands and get a photo with United States Senator John Thune. VanSickle also really enjoyed getting to meet some older veterans and hear some of their stories and experiences. One emotional part of the trip, he emphasized, was visiting the Tomb of the Unknown Solider.

The Honor Flight is a one-time opportunity if chosen. A friend of VanSickle filled out and sent in the form. He and was on a waiting list for two years until the organization contacted him. It is a free trip for all veterans and includes a free flight and three free meals. For this in particular trip, \$175,000 was donated in order 84 veterans to go. VanSickle highly recommends the trip if one gets the opportunity. He added, "You won't regret the trip if you get the chance to go."

Upon completion of the trip, each veteran received an Honorable Discharge Certificate with their name printed on it, along with a challenge
