General Election 2016 is one for the record books

The voice of Clark County since 1880

▲ Clark County continues to vote heavily Republican

Regarding the 2016 General Election, the summation headline could read: "Clark County election mirrors South Dakota"; or "Trump wins presidency"; or "Republicans continue to dominate in Clark

Republican Donald J. Trump was elected president during last week's Nov. 8 General Election. Trump carried South Dakota by a 61.53 percent margin over Democratic nominee Hillary Clinton. Trump won the popular vote 62.9 million to 62.2 million as well as the decisive electoral college vote 306 to 232. In Clark County Trump won 1,139 to 398 for Clinton. Libertarian Johnson garnered 103 votes.

Clark County Auditor Chris Tarbox reported that she felt election day went very smooth. There were 318 absentee ballots cast in Clark County. The voter turnout in Clark County was 71% compared to 69.2% turnout statewide.

County Commissioner, voters chose Chris Sass with 189 votes over Eric Caulfield with 174 votes, in a close, contested election.

In South Dakota Legislative District 2, State Senator Brock Greenfield (R) ran unopposed. For the District 2 House race, Clark County voters re-elected incumbents Lana Greenfield (R) and Burt Tulson (R) with 1,007 and 1,015 votes respectively in the county. John Graham received 529 county votes.

On the state level, the incumbents were the winners in both the U.S. Senate and U.S. House races. In the Senate race, Republican John Thune with 72% of the votes defeated Democrat Jay Williams with 28%. Clark County voters also chose Thune 1,269 to 408 over Wil-

For the U.S. House of Representative, Republican Kristi Noem collected 64% of state votes to defeat

On the county level for District 2 Paula Hawks with 36%. In Clark County, Noem collected 1,099 votes to 584 for Hawks.

> Chris Nelson (R) defeated Henry Red Cloud (D) for Public Utilities Commissioner, 75% to 25%. In Clark County Nelson had 1,369 votes and Red Cloud, 245.

Ballot Measures

Following are the unofficial county results of the statewide ballot is-

- ◆ Constitutional Amendment R passes at the state level by 50.6%; in Clark County it was defeated with 857 no votes to 747 yes votes.
- ◆ Constitutional Amendment S - passes at state level by 59.6%; in Clark County, yes votes of 996 won over no votes of 648.
- ◆ Constitutional Amendment T does not pass at state level, 57% no to 42.9% yes - and in Clark County it was also defeated by 960 no votes



The advantage could go to the deer hunter this weekend

Deer season opens this Saturday. It could be very interesting as to what the weatherman has in store for the area this coming weekend.

The fall to this point has been extremely mild and next week's forecast is a normal one, but this Friday could see adverse weather conditions.

"It sounds like snow and wind are to arrive Friday," said Clark County G,F&P Conservation Officer Kyle Lenzner. "If the snow stays in North Dakota, only 1-3 inches of snow are predicted. Regardless, we will get snow and wind on Friday, limiting deer movement and then the deer should be moving again on Saturday."

Lenzner then chuckled and said that there are no guarantees when it comes to hunting, especially when trying to predict the weather. He added that deer numbers look good and then shared that he had proof that deer are numerous and on the

"Yes, I even hit two deer with vehicles last week, one with my private vehicle and one with the G,F&P pickup. Just a friendly reminder to motorists that deer are

out there and they're on the move." Getting back to Saturday's weather forecast, "The high on Saturday is to be around 30°, with the low around 15°," Lenzner stated. "Last year that's about where the temperature was, but the key here is how much snow we get and how windy it is. The wind forecast for
