Paschen served 20 years as a Seabee and construction mechanic chief, E7 with the United States Navy. Also a coxswain and having worked for the Navy Seals, Paschen has since retired in Clark.

Raymond Biberdorf stated, "It means everything." He joined the Air Force in 1941 and went on to be a Boeing aircraft mechanic working on the B-17 and the B-29 airplanes. The B-29 was the type of plane that dropped the atom bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Raymond served until his discharge in September of



Walt Anderson also served in North Africa and Italy from 1940 to 1944. He worked as a radio operator and spent a lot of time in a jeep serving with the U.S. Army. "Some parts I'd like to forget about," he said. "But it's nice to honor the veterans on that day. I just got a card in the mail from my daughter in honor of Veterans Day."

Owen Birkholtz said, "The veterans have contributed so much, there should be a day to honor them." Owen served from July of 1955 to May of 1957 in the U.S. Army. He was a track vehicle inspector with the Third Armored Division out of Fort Knox, Kentucky. He also went to Germany which he said was a good experience. Agriculture in Germany was getting started again after recuperating from the war. He spent the winter of 1955 at the Aberdeen Proving grounds in Baltimore, Md. where the Army tested track vehicles.

John Audus was drafted into the Army in 1944. He was trained with the Army's infantry for combat duty. He was planning on being

# Steady traffic at the polls

Kenneth and Harriet Nordhus begin the voting process on Election Day 2012, Tuesday, Nov. 6. They voted in Precinct II, Clark Ward I in the Community Center of the Ullyot Building. Poll workers to the left include Carolyn Harding and Bernice Halling and Susan Bowers, not pictured.

The election worker's day starts early at 6:00 a.m. as they take their oath of office, count the blank ballots and set up the voting booths making sure there are enough pencils and supplies for the day. When the polls close at 7:00 p.m., the take down process

begins and workers finish around 8:00 p.m. taking the ballots to the courthouse to be counted by the Auto-Mark machine. Thirty-one absentee ballots were received before the voting began on Tuesday for Ward I in Clark.

Secretary of State Jason Gant says no irregularities have been reported across the state mid-morning. And he says the polls in South Dakota seem to have steady traffic despite many voters who cast their ballots early. Gant says he's hearing that turnout is good and things are going smoothly.

### "Slow" describes pheasant hunting season to this point

'Real slow' is how Clark County Game, Fish and Parks conservation officer Kyle Lenzer describes the pheasant season to this point.

"The July 17, 2010 hailstorm, along with the bird killing winter of 2010-11, was really hard on the birds and it is a long recovery process," said Lenzer. "We are up numbers wise from a year ago, but we're still down."

Lenzer speculated that during the opening weekend of the pheasant season hunters averaged a bird a day. "Hunters tell me that they just haven't seen a lot of birds," stated Lenzer.

"The opening weekend was quite busy, with more hunting pressure and more birds taken on the western edge of the county," he contin-

The biggest complaints the game warden has been seeing deal with road hunting laws and the 660' law. "With all the raccoons and coyotes, it should be a good year for trackers and maybe that will help the pheasant population in years to come, as well," Lenzer stated.

Elsewhere in the northeastern part of the state, pheasant hunters found birds in a mixed bag of areas. "People were hunting shelterbelts and cattail sloughs as well as in the grass," said Region I game manager Jacqui Ermer. "The CREP areas in Marshall County were extremely busy," she said.

Eermer estimates that hunters were averaging a bird apiece, but were seeing good numbers. "Hunters in Faulk, McPherson and Edmunds counties were having a little

more success, with about two birds each," she added. Early week rains were a blessing as they reduced fire dangers in the area and hunters were glad to see it, she said.

## Clark City Council has a full agenda at November meeting

With the inevitable cold weather of winter on its way, the Clark City Council discussed various matters which go hand in hand with winter maintenance and winter routine, at the November meeting, Monday, at City Hall.

Getting the city police department upgraded to where it wants to be is a priority of the council and Clark Police Chief Jeremy Wellnitz talked about purchasing equipment through the Highway Safety Grant, which is through both the federal government and the state of South Dakota.

Wellnitz has been measured for a bullet proof vest and requested

speed boards (for US Highway 212), upgrades in radar and breath testing for alcohol and an in-car camera. The cost of these items would be \$18,341, with the cost to the city at \$5,471, according to Wellnitz's

The council also agreed to fix the back up police car, the 2001 Ford Crown Vic. The cost was expected to be around \$1,500 to make the car road worthy.
