## Gov. Noem proposes lean budget for FY2021

will mean a lean budget year for the

During her annual budget address, Gov. Kristi Noem noted that a change in federal law would prevent South Dakota from continuing to collect sales tax on internet use. When that change goes into effect in July of next year, the state will lose \$20 million in revenue. Municipalities are projected to lose \$10 million.

"This will provide permanent tax relief for families and businesses who currently pay the government for simply accessing the internet," Noem told a joint session of the Legislature on Tuesday. "That's great news for South Dakota families and also a lean budget year for the

Noem's proposed \$4.9 billion budget for FY2021 includes \$1.7 billion in general funds, \$1.7 billion in federal funds and \$1.4 billion in other

The loss of \$20 million in internet tax revenue will be felt hardest in the area of ongoing revenue. Data that Noem shared with lawmakers showed that in the past five budgets, South Dakota has had an average of \$52 million in increased revenue. After adjustments, the FY2021 projection for new, ongoing revenue is \$22.7 million. In addition to the \$22.7 million

projected in ongoing revenue, Noem also called for spending \$18.5 million in one-time funds including \$16.7 million from the budget re-

During the last legislative session, when Noem made her first budget speech to the Legislature,

### Crocker Wind Farm is now online and operating

online and producing electrical energy. In a news release from Geronimo Energy, Thursday, it announced the start of commercial operations for the Crocker Wind Farm, a 200 megawatt wind energy project with 77 wind turbines located in northern and northwest Clark County. The Crocker Wind Farm has Virtual Power Purchase Agreements in place with leading corporations, Walmart and Cargill. The project was built by Wanzek Construction and utilizes GE 2.7- 116 wind tur-

Because of the type of project the Crocker Wind Farm is and the enormity of the project, there was some opposition to the wind towers. This opposition played out in county commission meetings as well as South Dakota Public Utilities commission meetings.

"Crocker coming online represents the culmination of many years of collaboration with the community and has and will continue to bring economic development to rural South Dakota," said Blake Nixon, Chief Executive Officer

The Crocker Wind Farm is now for Geronimo Energy. "Crocker is unique in that it is 100% contracted by corporate Virtual Power Purchase Agreements. Increasingly more corporations are making the choice to include renewable energy procurement in their sustainability goals - and Geronimo is proud to be playing a role in our industry's continued growth and expansion into corporate power purchasing."

The news release continues: Geronimo began working with local landowners to develop Crocker with the intent to positively impact its local and state host communities. Crocker is estimated to have provided hundreds of millions of dollars in economic impact throughout the development and construction phases, including job creation, increased local spending, and capital infrastructure improvements. In the first 20 years of operation, the project is anticipated to further benefit the economy with tens of millions in tax revenue, landowner payments, and new full-time job creation, as well as \$800,000 in
