

## Unified judicial system warns about jury duty phone scams

The South Dakota Unified Judicial System is warning the public about a nationwide telephone scam threatening arrest for missing jury duty.

During the call, the scammer impersonates a law enforcement officer or court official and claims the victim has failed to report for jury duty. The scammer tells the victim they can avoid arrest or other repercussions by making a payment or purchasing a pre-paid card.

If someone receives such a call or email, they should not provide any personal information or payment and should hang up. South Dakota courts do not call prospective jurors and ask for money or personal identifying information over the telephone. If someone summoned for jury duty fails to appear, that person will receive correspondence by U.S. mail, not by phone or email.

Here are some tips to avoid becoming the victim of this type of scam:


Always be suspicious of unsolic-

ited phone calls. Never give money or personal information to someone with whom you don't have ties and did not initiate

• Trust your instincts. If an unknown caller pressures you or says things that don't sound right, hang

• If concerns remain about the caller's claims, verify the information with the appropriate law enforcement agency or court officials.

## Johnson Trucking has been in business for 60 years

"This is all I've wanted to do. It's my dream job," Lucas Johnson recalls, standing in the family farm yard beside his father Jim and uncle Dennis Johnson.

Lucas is a third generation owner/operator within the Johnson Trucking business. "I remember

standing in the alleyway at the elevator working the year after my high school graduation when Dad called and said, 'You want to start trucking? Now is your time'. Those were the busiest two weeks of my life, getting my truck, CDL license and insurance, but it was the beginning of my dream job," he said.

when his father brought a semi truck home; now, he is 23. "Lucas was as tall as the shifter," Jim recalled. With the passage of time, that little boy has grown up and drives his own big rig.

For 60 years this December, Clark County residents have seen

Lucas was only three years old the Johnson semi trucks rolling down the highways, hauling ag commodities. "I can't imagine how many loads we've done or how many head of cattle we've hauled. It's been a lot," Jim said.
