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Cyclone grapplers are ready to reload for the season

After a highly successful 2023-2024 campaign, the Clark-Willow Lake wrestling teams are ready to reload. The Cyclones had a banner year last season, placing second in the Northeast Conference, qualifying as a team for the state dual tournament for the first time in program history and placing four wrestlers on the podium at the state tournament.

Where are the Cyclones headed in 2024-25? According to head coach Greg Marx, "From the looks of it, we are in for another competitive run with our Northeast Conference foes. The NEC is the conference of champions and to win that would be a big check mark for our team moving onto the state duals. We do have a different team this year with some major holes to fill. We can no longer rely on just winning matcheslike last year. I will be asking all our wrestlers to score bonus points consistently."

The boys' squad returns three state place winners from last year, including seniors Joshua Kannegieter (fourth) Elliot Bratland (eighth) and junior Cooper Pommer (fifth). The team boasts experience in 2024 state qualifiers Cade Gaikowski and Austin Vig, who are both freshmen.

With a veteran crew, the sky is the limit, and the bar has been set high. "Our goal for everyone is to win state, and that will never change. My expectations, of course, are to improve on last year's state placers/qualifiers to place higher and of course have a year where the entire team makes it into the state tournament," added Coach Marx.

The Cyclonesreturn a strong nucleus but also have an infusion of youth who are striving to make an impact.

"This year, the impact will mostly be seen on the girls' side, as we have six newcomerswith Mia Holmstrom being the only wrestler with experience. I think with these girls' naturally competitive nature, we won't have any issue getting them on the mat and wrestling competitively,"

stated Coach Marx.


