Dahl is a 2001 graduate from Watertown High School. She earned her degree in Elementary Education at Mount Marty in 2008 and went on to get her Master in Administration from the University of South Dakota (USD), in 2017.

# Clark School looking at life skills education for special ed The consensus of the parents rapid COVID tests this week than l

The first 90 minutes of the February meeting of the Clark School Board was a presentation and discussion of a proposed program for consideration.

By way of a ZOOM presentation, Heidi Johnson, of Mitchell, talked of a PAES Lab, which would provide a variety of options for students with a disability, regarding work skills, work behaviors and work paths.

Clark High School special education teacher Susan Schmit and superintendent Luanne Warren were very impressed when they saw Johnson's program in action and felt even though it is a 'cutting edge' option and it would be new to this part of the state, that it is a great opportunity and would like the school board to explore this pos-

PAES is an acronym for Practical Assessment Acclimation System. Johnson explained that "it's a formal assessment" in a 'work lab setting' with six to eight levels, providing a variety of 'life skills' for disabled students. Teachers are the boss and students are the employees, with stand up work tables in five different work areas and 264 job boxes.

Three sets of parents were in attendance and they also were impressed with the options and opportunities. The initial cost of this program would be \$26,352 for the equipment and software, computis that it would be a helpful 'little boost' and the program would be an asset to the goal of adult mainstreaming.

No decisions were made at this time, but this offered a timely sequi into capital outlay discussion for


"Bids are coming in slow," said superintendent Warren of the bid process for potential capital outlay building projects. The cost for new tile in the commons and hallway areas is \$64,000. Plus, if the Field House has new flooring, there is over 6,000 square feet of space, as well. The flooring of the new areas would be much different and no decisions have been made in these projects.

- ▲ It was reported last month that current superintendent Warren is retiring at the end of the school year and after a 50-minute executive session, the three remaining administrators, Travis Ahrens, Renae Dahl and business manager Mary Nelson were rehired on a unanimous ballot.
- ▲ The school board then spent the next hour and a half reviewing superintendent applications. The board adjourned at 11:00 p.m.
- ▲ Warren reported that currently there are two staff and two students out of school with COVID-19, or quarantining.

# Clark was home to Comet, Gopher and Packer star tackle Urban Odson

Because of Urban and other players who stayed there the building was saved when the new TCF stadium was built.
- His uncle in Amboy bought him his football shoes.
- Being a farm boy living in the center of the Twin Cities was a challenge. He would take the street car to the end of the line and go visit farms. Even after 35W was built he asked to come in on Lyndal, his favorite street car route.
- The 1940 team was ranked as one of the best all time. Half the teams the Gophers beat were in the top 10 in the final AP poll.

· Odson came back to Clark in January, 1941 where he was honored by approximately 200 people. He was accompanied by two Gophers, Joe Mernick their great kicker and full back Bob Schweiger. The told how he missed out on being captain by one vote to future Heisman trophy winner Bruce

Urban Odson, of Clark was a football stand-out on a team full of all-stars for the Minnesota Gophers from 1939-1941. Odson's college career at Minnesota took place during the Gophers' dynasty years and the team was crowned National Champions in 1940 and 1941 with Odson as a starter who played a key role in the program's success.

### **Honors and Accolades**

During a time when only 11 players could be selected to an All-American team, Odson was recognized frequently. He was a consensus All-American in 1940 and averaged 54 minutes of playing time per game as a tackle on both sides of the line. In 1941 he received five All-American awards, as well as Big Ten honors, during a season that had Odson playing the entire year with an 18-pound knee brace
