## Clark administrators offered contracts at February school board meeting

All three Clark School administrators were offered contracts Monday, at the February meeting of the Clark School Board, at the high/ middle school library.

The board went into executive session at 7:25 p.m. and came out at 8:50 p.m. and then offered oneyear contracts to superintendent Luanne Warren, principal Jerry Hartley and business manager Mary Nelson, with salaries to be determined at a later date.

Also hired at this meeting was district technology coordinator, for the 2016-17 school year, Travis Weyh, Watertown. He will replace

# Greg Furness owns only Success, Dakota Territory postmark in existence

Back before many railroads and towns were established and completed in Clark County there were the post offices and quite a few of them to one's surprise with names that have since gone by the way-

One such post office was the Success Post Office in section 33 of Washington Township, in southern Clark County.

Local historian/collector Greg Furness is the owner of the only postmark known to exist from the Success Post Office. Not only does he have a postmarked letter, inside of the letter was a land deed from postmaster, Butler Winter and his official postmaster general appointment certificate, signed May 28,

Furness is a member of the Dakota Postal History Society which includes both North and South Dakota and he also has an extensive collection of post cards.

"In one of my issues of the Dakota Collector magazine that they sent out, they featured all of the post offices in Clark County," explained Furness. "I later acquired a letter with a postmark from the Success Post Office. It was mailed from New York and I acquired it from a dealer in postal history from Florida. What interested me more so, at first was a signature from W. Grover Cleveland on the side of the certificate. He was president when the land deal was signed in 1887."

Butler Winter was the second postmaster appointed to Success in 1884 and President Cleveland's land deal wasn't signed until 1887.

Walter Q. Gresham was the Postmaster General on the certificate that signified Winter's appointment. "Gresham was an officer in the Union Army and also a two time candidate for the presidency," added Furness. "Chester Arthur was the president when the Success Post Office's first postmaster was appointed."

Following Winter was Robert Finley as postmaster in 1887 to

The Success Post Office was formed in Berlin Township by Sherman B. Griffing as an expression

Going back in history, 32 post offices have been opened in Clark County since 1879. Many have been closed with names such as Suc-

cess, Frisby, Jolly, Dana, Darien and Stusted with many in rural areas. Shown above, Greg Furness of Clark, an avid collector and historian has acquired the only Success Post Office postmark, known to still ex-

ist. As a bonus, inside the letter was a Post Office General appointment certificate from 1884 (Butler Winter's) and Winter's land deed for the location dated in 1887. Furness is also in possession of a Jolly postmark from the Carpenter area.

It opened on December 4, 1883 and continued until May 14, 1894, after which, local mail was processed in Willow Lake. The original name proposed was Cherry Lake, after a lake in the southeast corner of the township, named in 1880 by early surveyors because of the wild cherry trees on its bank.

Berlin Township was originally named for the Bayer family homesteaders who had come from Ber-

the name was changed after WW I, the anti-German feeling among residents resulted in a petition that brought about the name change to Washington Township in November of 1918.

The Success Post Office was one of those that was moved a few miles in 1885 to a nearby location. Eight early post offices made similar moves in their existence in Clark

"As elected leaders, school board members serve an important role," Superintendent Warren said. "They are the link between the school and community."

A shortfall of \$127,318.80 in the Henry School 2016-17 general fund has the school board talking opting out of the tax freeze. Right above this figure in the handout given at Wednesday's Henry School public meeting is the sentence: "If the 2016-2017 Budget stays the same we will not have sufficient cash on hand to operate the school."

Henry superintendent Steve Zirbel and school board president Neil Jensen used the hour-long meeting to present the numbers at hand and to answer any and all questions that the 50 or so patrons in attendance had to offer.

Henry School Board members include: Jensen, Paula Blue, David Fuller, Nicole Watson and Adam Hartley. The school board meets this Friday, at 7:00 a.m. and at this meeting a new opt out resolution will be proposed.

Jensen then spoke of the reality of an opt out election, to be held Tuesday, April 12, 2016.

"If the opt out is voted down, we do not have enough money to fund our general fund budget," he said and added that if schools run out of money, there are two choices, either dissolve or consolidate.

The school board president added that this opt out option has been on the horizon for years and Zirbel voiced maintenance and repairs along with some unforeseen costs have brought about this \$292,536.00 budget deficit for 2015-

Zirbel said he really didn't have a grasp on what the legislature will do or won't do this session. "The state legislature could really help us out here, but who knows what

they're going to do." Currently the state funds \$5,600

is necessary for Henry School to remain a positive environment for students. Schools are for children." Questions and answers are a vital part of a public meeting. Following, from the Henry School website, are the questions and ensuing an-

swers, provided by the school: **Q:** Do we have a fund balance? **A.** Yes we do. July 1 of this year our fund balance for General Fund was \$457,753.20.

Q. If you get the Opt Out how much can you put in all the funds? **A.** It all goes to General Fund only.

**Q.** What are your projections on how long the school would stay open? A. For the foreseeable future given we have adequate funding.

**Q.** Does it cost the school to transport the out of district kids? **A.** No more than it costs to transport in district kids.

Q. Let's say this school board is going to take care of this money but what happens later on when the same board members are not here? A. I believe the Board of Education will adjust the published resolution on February 12th.

Henry School Board hosts opt out public meeting Q. Where would kids go if the school closes? A. Kids would go to Clark, Watertown, Hamlin and

> Q. How many kids are in each class? A. K-14; 1st-16; 2nd-8; 3rd-14; 4th-8; 5th-18; 6th-11; 7th-10; 8th-8; 9th-15; 10th-15; 11th-11;

> Q. Would you still be in a deficit if the legislature passes everything?

> Q. Going by the Dept. of Ed. why is there a difference for Expenditures? A. Annual reports will always differ from audit reports by a small margin. The annual reports and audit reports are available at

> **Q.** Is your open enrollment keeping pace with what you are losing as kids graduate? A. The state of South Dakota has failed to fund education adequately but in the case of open enrolled students in Henry we receive the same funding dollars that we do for in district students.

Q. How do the open enrollment kids get in here? A. They make applications and have to enroll.

Q. How do you pay the Opt Out money back? A. The Opt Out money is levied to your taxes that are paid by the taxpayers of the Henry School District. There is no accumulation of debt.
