The Clark County Assessor's Office has submitted its 2018 valuation intentions to the SD Department of Revenue. The motivating factor behind these intentions are that assessment values are to re-

on the open market, with the exception of ag-land as that is based on a state productivity model.

According to Reidburn, bare agland will see a county-wide increase at approximately 4% on crop land and up 9.9% on non-crop land. Rural residential structures will be going up 9% across the county. The City of Clark will go up 15% on residential structures. Willow Lake will

Difficult valuation decisions flect what properties would sell for see the most significant increase at 65% on residential structures, and improved lots will increase as well.

This valuation situation has been brewing for several years. Said Reidburn, "The past several years, the non-ag class properties have failed to meet the minimal 85% sales ratio, as set by state statute. This year, the Department of Rev-

#### Superintendent and business manager rehired at February school board meeting Janisch submits retirement resignation

Superintendent Luanne Warren and business manager Mary Nelson were both rehired at the February meeting of the Clark School Board of Education, with salaries to be determined at a later date.

Current principal Jerry Hartley submitted his resignation at the December board meeting, so the Clark School Board is in the process of finding his replacement.

Also submitting his retirement resignation at the February school board meeting was 35-year CHS teaching veteran Greg Janisch. Janisch has been the agriculture education instructor and FFA advisor at Clark School since 1983.

Warren was hired during the public portion of the February board meeting, as her evaluation took place in January; Nelson was hired after the two hour and 10 minute executive session held for personnel and administration evaluations.

The 2017-18 school term is a little unique, as along with Hartley and Janisch, long-time Clark School educators Todd Jenkins and John Brown earlier this year submitted retirement resignations. In total, these four male educators served the Clark School district over 100 years, closer to 110 years.

Lane Hammer was hired at Monday's meeting to teach high school social science for 2018-19. Jenkins will be part-time building trades instructor in 2018-19.
