# 2019 South Dakota State Legislature has a little bit of everything

As the 2019 South Dakota State Legislature has 15 days left in the session, the three District 2 legislators held the Clark Cracker Barrel, Monday, at the Ullyot Building.

The two-hour informative question and answer session began with Clark County Farm Bureau representative Lee Kopriva introducing Rep. Kaleb Weis, Rep. Lana Greenfield and Sen. Brock Greenfield to the 20 in attendance.

Sen. Greenfield, is in his 10th term, starting his 19th year and is the President Pro Tempore of the SD

Sen. Greenfield, who has been in the legislature, either the house or the senate since 2000, showed his experience and knowledge expertise, going into detail on each and every topic brought up at the Cracker Barrel.

Roy Gjerde, Vienna, brought up the first topic, that the Senate is looking at tighter restrictions on young drivers. He is in favor of leaving the licensing policies as is.

In South Dakota, 14-year olds can obtain an instruction permit that allows them to drive from 6:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m.
