The Raymond Mosiac Lodge City of Clark is proposing #175 disbands after 99 years

The voice of Clark County since 1880

The Raymond Mosiac Lodge #175 was chartered on June 11, 1915. It was chartered by Phillip Schaller, James Foster and Charles Griffie.

Nearly one hundred years later, the Lodge will officially disband, once all of the paperwork is finished. This was the last Masonic lodge remaining in Clark County.

Three local residents, Keith Erickson, Roger Hurlbert and David Hink were initiated at the same time some 26 years ago. As the final paperwork is sent in, these three are the last officers of the organization with Erickson being the last 'Master', Hink the secretary and Hurlbert the treasurer.

Their final act of contribution was to give a scholarship fund to the Clark School. They will be giving two scholarships a year to the students for the next 10 years until the fund is used up.

Hurlbert is a third generation Mason and he still has his grandfather's membership card. Jess Mitchell paid his dues in December of 1931. Hurlbert's paternal grandfather Nathan and his son Lloyd, Roger's father, were also Masons. In keeping with tradition, Roger joined and so did his son Russ.

"I read about eight different Hurlberts in the records over the years," said Roger, who also served as Master of the Lodge (President) for a few years, taking his turn at the helm. His father Lloyd served as secretary for 15 years.

"In the 1930's, 40's and 50's, that was the social event of the month," stated Hink. His father, Floyd Hink, was also a Mason at the Raymond Lodge.

For a time, the Masonic Temple or meeting place of the group was over Andy's Bar in Raymond. While

not knowing the exact date, it's estimated in the 1970's is when the Masons moved into the back half of the former American Legion building on Flower Street in Raymond.

Records show that in 1951, there were 32 members and the first 50 year pins awarded at the Lodge were to Charles Dripps, Lloyd Rieke and Irvin Herther. Dripps owned the lumber yard, Rieke was a farmer and Herther was a school teacher. All had been in other lodges out of state before joining the Raymond Mosiac Lodge.

"We gained a few members over time as the Garden City Lodge closed and the Clark Lodge closed in 2002. Then we had members too from Doland and Frankfort attending our Lodge meetings," continued

"The state wide headquarters is in Sioux Falls, that is the Grand Lodge of South Dakota. In keeping up with our annual dues, we still are Masons and are still members. We just have a disbanded lodge.


Candidates have until March 25 to file the required number of petition signatures with the auditor's office to be eligible for 2014 elec-
