



Those in the audience waited well over two hours for the Willow Lake School Board to come out of executive session, for personnel discussion. Very few of the patrons who came to the 7:00 p.m. meeting had left by 10:15 p.m. when the 'open forum' discussion began.

The first 'forum' issue dealt with the resignation of Cindy Mafei, school secretary/administrative assistant. There was some discrepancy as to the title and job description of this position and it is posted this week in the Courier edition as administrative assistant.

The talk then turned to the superintendent's salary. There were questions concerning why a \$4,000 cut in pay to superintendent Terry Winegar's 2012-2013 salary.

School board president Marshall Edleman then explained the school board's position of looking for a half-time high school principal along with athletic director and elementary physical education or a combination thereof.

Edleman explained that the board Board meetings are a public is looking for a half-time principal duties. Winegar is the superintendent, high school principal, athletic director, head of special education, bus/transportation coordinator and elementary principal. Winegar was hired a year ago to do these duties at \$66,000.
