According to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service, crop progress and condition as of February 25, 2024 are as follows: the 69 percent adequate and two percent surplus. Winter wheat condition rated one percent very poor, six percent poor, 35 percent fair, 55 percent good and three percent excellent. The next report will be issued Monday, March 25.

South Dakota ranks in the top 10 states in the production of 25 agricultural commodities. Most of the crops are grown in the eastern half of the state, whereas the majority of livestock is raised in the western half. The most valuable crops that are grown in South Dakota are corn, soybeans, hay and haylage, wheat, sunflower, sorghum, millet and oats. South Dakota has about 28,300

farms and ranches throughout the state and has been unchanged since 2022. Land in farms and ranches in South Dakota totaled 42.3 million acres, and the average size of operation is about 14,495 acres.


