Senior Feature Horses have played an integral part in Walt Steiger's life

Born in 1935 near Leola, Walter Eugene Steiger grew up on farms that did not have electricity. Approximately seven miles northwest of town their first farm did not have running water either due to having trouble finding a well. Walter was one of four children born to Andreas and Ella ('Andrew' and 'Anna' (Mohr)) Steiger. He had two older brothers, Clarence and Duane and one younger sister Lorentina. His maternal grandmother Margaretha lived with them towards the end of her life after her husband William died. He recalls his grandfather Mohr being a very tall and sturdy built man and his grandma being a good cook and a big gardener. His Steiger grandmother lived in Leola with one daughter. He never did meet his grandfather Steiger.

Growing up

When attending the one room country school, it was always at least a one mile walk up until the fourth grade when the family moved to a different farm, this time northeast of Leola. Then it was two miles to go to school. Walt first learned the English language when he went to school. Only German was spoken at home. It wasn't until later years that his parents learned English. Young Walt always rode his Shetland pony to school where a barn was kept for the horses. Sometimes a 'broom start' would be required to get a stubborn pony going out of the yard - this being a whack on the north end of a horse going south by Walt's mother to get the pony going.

Gathering water to drink from a neighboring farm and beating erasers after school were duties required of the school kids he recalled.

Walt Steiger looks most natural in his cowboy hat as he has spent a lifetime on the farm and with horses. Born near Leola in 1935, working on a pipeline in adulthood brought him through Clark were he met his future bride Marilyn Seefeldt.

Also in the U.S. Army, after his service time was up, he came back to marry his sweetheart and shortly after ended up farming in the Clark County area.

Horses have always played a big part in his life, for this lifetime member of the South Dakota Draft Horse and Mule Breeders Association.
