2015-2016 certified staff negotiated agreement approved by school board

May is always a busy month for meeting, the board accepted the school boards and the Clark School Board meeting lasted over five hours on Monday. Three hours and forty minutes of the meeting were in two separate executive sessions. The first executive session lasted twenty minutes and dealt with a student matter. The second closed session lasted three hours and twenty minutes for the purpose of administrative negotiations and a personnel matter. No motions were made after either executive session. negotiated package between the Clark School District and certified staff for the 2015-2016 school year. "In a nutshell, the teachers settled for \$500 on the base (\$34,280) with \$300 extra going to all returning staff members," stated superintendent Luanne Warren. Plus colony teachers will receive one-time money of \$500 due to multiple class preparations. The school district also will pay \$415 toward single policy (health) insurance.

The Clark School Board accepted the low bid of Seppanen Contracting for the high school curbing and driveway project on the east side of the high school. This work is to be done by July 3, when the C.H.S. Alumni Banquet is to be held. Seppanen's bid was \$91,797.96.

The Honeywell Building Solutions discussion and motion regarding a feasibility study of school district buildings was postponed until the June board meeting.

High school/middle school principal Jerry Hartley will be the Clark High School Athletic Director for the 2015-16 school year. Superintendent Warren said that she felt

Two weather patterns, one on Wednesday night into Thursday and one on Sunday, have brought considerable moisture to the area.


Another rain event is planned for Thursday, as well as Saturday and when we are coming off a dry fall and winter, "more is better".

Hazel Ness turns 100 on Syttende Mai

"It's been a pretty good life. I've had good health as long as I can remember," says 100-year-old Hazel Ness of Clark. "I've outlived all of my brothers and sisters, I must have done something right I guess."

Hazel Josefine Christopherson was born on May 17, 1915 at home on the Christopherson farm, as were all her six brothers and sisters. Anders (Andrew) and Marie (Kjeikrud) Christopherson were the parents of Nels, Margaret, Clara, Anna, Hazel, Alf and Odean. With a strong Norwegian heri-

tage, Hazel's parents spoke both Norwegian and English at home and Hazel can speak both languages. When visiting relatives and friends from Norway came to their farm, Norwegian was used in their household. At their church Pleasant Lutheran Church (Pleasant Lutheran Church was located approximately three and a half miles west of Vienna before it burned down in 1963) where Hazel was baptized and confirmed, services were held now and then using the Norwegian language. She recalls when her childhood church burned to the ground. They could see it from their farm about five miles away.

Growing up near Naples Hazel attended the Foxton

School, walking a mile and a half every day to get there. It was a one room school with eight grades. "I carried an old syrup pail and my lunch was usually fruit and a sand-



wegian Constitution Day, May 17. This year will be a special birthday. She turns 100 years old as she was born in the year 1915 on the Christopherson farm in Clark County which was homesteaded by her grandparents in 1884. Her father Anders was 11 years old when he came to South Dakota from Bynesseth, Norway. "I don't feel 100 years old," says Ness. "I've been very fortunate in my life with pretty good health.'

wich. We had a lot of plum and cherry trees and we canned a lot of vegetables, beef and pork.

"Walking to school in four buckle overshoes, our socks would get wet

when the snow was deep and we'd all hang them to dry by the stove at

Falling in the strawpile

One memory that stands out was during harvest/threshing time. While the threshers were in the house having dinner, Hazel and her sister Anna decided it was a good time to play in the straw pile. She fell down deep in between the two main piles. "Good thing my sister Anna was hollering loudly - the hired man came and pulled me out. I could have easily suffocated. I think I was about five or six and Anna was a couple years older. We had a lot of fun together," said Ness. "We worked a lot, too, in the garden, in the kitchen, doing chicken and hog chores, bringing in wood and coal and picking corn cobs out of the pens also to burn for heat."

Picking out flour bags at the store made out of material that matched enabled one enough material to make a dress. "You had to have a new dress for a special dance you know," chuckled Ness. "I remember in the late 20's, we'd put an old curling iron in the top part of the old kerosene lamps chimney to heat them up to curl your hair. You'd have to let it cool a little first though, so it wasn't too hot. About then permanents were coming out, too. I had one in high school before I was married."
