# **Brenda Jenkins retires after** 33 years in the classroom

Brenda Jenkins was honored last Thursday at a retirement party at Clark High School. A CHS graduate, she's been teaching for the past 33 years, with 31 of those years at her alma mater. Teaching math, computer classes, coaching volleyball, basketball, track and a cheer coach, she has been the school's go-to for computer/technology issues the last 15 years as the technology director.

Starting a new chapter in her life, she will be assisting at the Furness Funeral Home as a part of her future retirement plans.

"I really enjoyed my own school years at Clark High School and I wanted to come back," were the sentiments of CHS computer/technology coordinator Brenda Jenkins, who is retiring from teaching.

Jenkins will be retiring this May, having worked the last 31 years at Clark High School. She is a 1979 CHS graduate.

After her graduation from Northern State University in 1983 with a BS in education majoring in math (minor in coaching), her first job was being the technology director in Leola for two years.

From there, she was hired at the Clark School to be the junior high math teacher, followed by the high school math teacher.

"I taught some computer classes too and was then given the choice of teaching math or computers full time. I thought to myself, what would the students enjoy more? I chose technology and from there

#### **Two Wheat Walks** featured in **Clark County** next Wednesday


