
Raymond Legion's flag placement list has grown

office, she knew where to look to find and locate the veterans. Six were added to this year's list.



He did a really good job, we all agreed."

Obama spent two hours in Watertown on May 8 with his secret service entourage arriving earlier to prepare for his arrival. Clark's law enforcement also aided in the security details for the day's event.

The Clark County Courier interviewed several area residents who were involved and attended the graduation.

Willow Lake alumna Michaela Johnson was one of the graduates, earning a degree in Human Services as did her classmates Cortney Binger and Shelby Blair, both Clark graduates.

"Everybody was really excited and ready to see the president," exclaimed Johnson. "Walking in was breathtaking - to see so many people there. We didn't come into the auditorium until right before the president did. It was probably about 5:15 p.m. His plane was late, - about an hour later than expected. All of us (graduates) waited in the DD Miller Auditorium. We weren't bored waiting, it was nice to spend a little more time talking with our classmates."

Meanwhile in the Watertown High School gymnasium the general admission by ticket only waited and listened to music over the loud speaker and were offered water by the local boy scouts.

Each graduate was given four tickets originally for family members to attend. However at graduation rehearsal days before, a three hour process, the group found out, some extra tickets were available, so some graduates were able to get a few more - those who had asked ahead of time.

Johnson invited her family, Jim and LeAnn - her parents, her brother Lucas and her boyfriend Jeremy. "It was a once in a lifetime experience for Jim and I," said LeAnn. "We may never see another president in person in our lifetimes.

"We waited in line about an hour to get in the building," said L. Johnson. "We got there at 2:00. Then we had to go through security - there were several lines where the process was similar to airport security - if you walked through the scanner and it beeped they held you back. You'd put your keys, phone, cameras aside and they went through everyone's purse.

"They told the kids (graduates) more than the crowd. Michaela texted me when she heard that the President's plane had landed, so we knew it would be soon. It was a 45 minute delay from when he was scheduled. The whole program was put on hold until he got there. When we saw all the reporters go

up front, we knew it would be soon. "After his speech, the other speakers and the rest of the program waited until the president left

the building. Some security came

back to get the Presidential seal of of the podium and then after that the program continued." Clark High School and LATI graduate Cody Wookey commented "It was all really cool and very interesting. What caught my attention during the speech was when he talked about in the future, making

it so every kid can go to a two-year

vo-tech school for free. People in the crowd were yelling - 'Do it'. It was really cool to watch. "I got six tickets total. When we signed up on the Internet, they had a drop box at the bottom if you wanted more. I put down two and got two extra, so I was able to invite my grandma and aunt besides my sisters and parents - (Tom and

Kathy Wookey). "We had to wait a little longer, but it was all worth it. I waited two years for graduation - what's another hour?" ended Wookey.

"How many people can say they had the president speak at their graduation," said Lori Page whose
