Korean War Veterans awarded Ambassador Peace Medals

Monday was a big day at the Clark American Legion Hall, as several Korean War Veterans, or a family member were honored with an "Ambassador for Peace" medal.

The "Ambassador for Peace" medal was bestowed on all Korean War veterans in an expression of appreciation from the people of the Republic of Korea for those who served in Korea's land, air and sea from June 25, 1950 through October 25, 1954.

"It has been an honor to set up this award," said Larry Zimmerman, Secretary of the South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs. "They recognize what these heroes have given and as a token of their sincerest appreciation they will present them with an Ambassador for Peace Medal which symbolizes their adoration and appreciation for their service and sacrifice."

El Niño to fade and La Niña to emerge

South Dakota's weather this summer could be a bit of a climate roller coaster according to outlooks issued by the National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Climate Prediction Center May 19, 2016.

The outlook shows the early summer months to be wetter and possibly cooler in the southwest part of

"These conditions usually fit together in the warm season," explained Dennis Todey, State Climatologist/Associate Professor. "If conditions are wetter, South Dakota is rarely warmer than average for any length of time in the summer."

Laura Edwards, SDSU Extension Climate Field Specialist added that the current, fairly wet soil conditions in areas of South Dakota
