

Her bout with fighting cancer started in July of last year. She found a hard lump about the size of one centimeter long in her breast and went to the Clark Clinic right away and from there scheduled a mammogram. Being only 37 years old, she had never had one before. Before that procedure, she had an ultrasound done and a biopsy was performed on a Friday. "The next Monday, PA Louann Streff called her and told her that it was cancer. She had her biopsy done at the Breast Health Institute in Sioux

The next Wednesday, they met with a surgeon who gave them two options. "My husband Darin asked the doctor, 'If it was your wife, what would you tell her to do?'," stated Jessica. "His reply was that my chances were the same with both treatments in my case. So I went with the lumpectomy and radiation course of treatment, as I found the lump early and it was only a centimeter or about one inch big. I had the lumpectomy a couple weeks later. At the time of the surgery when I was still under anesthesia, they did a sentinel node biopsy to check the surrounding tissue and that came back good.

"Following the surgery I did three weeks worth of radiation or 16 treatments. I also had genetic testing done, thinking of my daughter and nieces and that came back

"Another test done was an Oncotype DX test which basically gives your cancer tumor a score which helps the oncologist determine if chemo is necessary. My test showed the chance of recurrence being 10%, so chemo wasn't necessary. The
