# **Brooks sentenced** to State penitentiary

Clinton Brooks, age 42, of Clark, South Dakota, appeared before Circuit Judge Carmen Means in Clark County Circuit Court on Monday, May 3, 2021, for sentencing in connection with his earlier plea of guilty to one count of Distribution of a Controlled Substance (Methamphetamine).

According to Clark County State's Attorney Chad Fjelland, Judge Means sentenced Brooks to an 8 year term in the state penitentiary with 3 years of the penitentiary sentence suspended. In addition, Brooks was sentenced to an additional 5 years in the state penitentiary with 2 <sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>2</sub> years suspended for revocation of an earlier suspended sentence for Ingestion of Methamphetamine.

The charges stem from a June 2020 investigation conducted by the **Clark Police Department and South** Dakota Division of Criminal Investigation.

Speaking of Brooks' sentence, Fjelland said, "methamphetamine continues to be an extremely destructive force in our community. It impacts our court calendar every single session in ways beyond simple criminality. In large measure, our current system is designed to try to rehabilitate users and those

### The book will close on librarian Annette Boehnke's career

"It's amazing how I've come to know every book in here and where it's located," stated longtime Clark School librarian Annette Boehnke.

Spending her mornings at the high school library and afternoons at the elementary library, she will soon be spending her time wherever she desires as she is retiring at the end of this school year.

"You have to be able to find the right book that fits that student. I'll ask what their hobbies are, what they enjoy - maybe even what kind of movies they like, to get an idea of what they may like.

"They will enjoy reading if it's something they are interested in," continued Boehnke. "Over the years, I've tried to promote a life long love of reading to the students.

"I will miss the kids the most and those hugs from the little kids. I've enjoyed working with them all of these years."

Boehnke went on to say that it helps to be very organized in doing the work of a librarian. Since 2004, she has been the sole librarian for both schools, a job that was formerly done by three people many years ago. Working in the summer time helps with catching up on ordering books, cataloging them and weeding out the old ones. As new ones arrive there is only so much room and some books have to go and be replaced. "We'll always keep the classics around, though," she explained.

"It's like Christmas when the new books arrive," she states. "That's always a fun time.'

#### Library additions

The last several years books known as graphic novels have become very popular explained Boehnke.

Not graphic like 'gory' or 'shocking' but graphic as in illustrations in cartoon form that go along with the story in the book. It's kind of like reading a comic book with pictures and graphics in boxes on every single page. Only it's a lot longer story than in comic books and there is usually only two to four cartoon boxes per page.
