Schlagel to replace Bjerke on **County Board of Commissioners** Election for District 2

The end of April marked the time that all individuals could file a petition for county constitutional elected offices in Clark County.

Two Clark County Board of Commissioner districts are up for election this year. In District 2, incumbent Chris Sass is being challenged by Eric Caulfield. In District 4, incumbent Robert Bjerke has chosen not to run for re-election. Terry Schlagel filed his petition for District 4 and will be the county commissioner, beginning in 2021.

Running unopposed for county positions are incumbents: treasurer - Kay Mahlen; coroner - Louann Streff and states attorney - Chad Fjelland.

Primary election

The primary election is Tuesday, June 2. Clark County Auditor Chris Tarbox is urging voting by mail ballots, which have already been sent to residents.

On the ballot will be the U.S Senate position, with Scyller Borglum challenging incumbent Mike Rounds and U.S Representative incumbent Dusty Johnson being opposed by Marty May. Both the U.S. Senate and U.S. House candidates are on the Republican side.

On the Democratic primary ballot, the U.S. President candidates Joe Biden and Bernie Sanders are up for election. Sanders suspended his campaign on April 8.
