Clark, Willow Lake school districts awarded grant for CTE programs

The Department of Education has awarded four grants totaling nearly \$3.8 million dollars to school districts to purchase equipment for new or existing career and technical education (CTE) programs. The grants were made possible by Senate Bill 59 from the 2023 legislative session which allocated \$5 million for CTE programs throughout the

Each grant supports collaboration among school districts to bring innovative CTE programs to stu-

The Clark and Willow Lake School Districts prepared their application for the CTE Collaborative Equipment Grant in April, and it was approved May 14.

The \$278,212 grant will enable the exchange of CTE programs between the Clark and Willow Lake School Districts enhancing access to health science, manufacturing and transportation for students in both districts.

Clark and Willow Lake are the only two school districts in Clark County. This grant will allow the students from both schools to explore careers and coursework in areas they would otherwise not have the opportunity to. This collabora-

existed for over 15 years.

The goal of this grant is to provide up to 20 students (each semester for at least the next five years) from each district the ability to participate in the Health Science, Transportation, Distribution and Logistics and Manufacturing clusters. These students will become the next generation of EMTs, CNAs, automotive technicians and many other trade services.


Through this collaborative CTE grant, the Willow Lake School District will be purchasing an Anatomage table, which is a 3-D virtual dissection table. The grant will also provide other health science classroom materials to provide the Willow Lake and Clark students a Health Science learning experience with cutting edge technologies. The Clark School District (CSD) currently has an agreement in place to purchase an adjacent commercial property that will be used to expand it's CTE course offerings. With the purchase of the facility, the Clark School District will add automotive and expanded small engine classes to their course offerings along with machine tool technology under the CTE clusters of Transportation, Distribution and Logistics cluster and Manufacturing. The commercial property mentioned is the former Tony's Collision Center.

"The Clark School District will be purchasing various equipment for a new Automotive class that we are offering and our Machine Tools course that we offer as well," Clark Superintendent Travis Ahrens stated. New welders, including wirefeed, TIG and stick welders, a welding simulator, CNC Plasma Table, CNC Lathe machine, plasma cutters and various automotive


The Corner Diner is one of 500 recipients of the grant funds and is now also eligible for an additional \$30,000 that is available to 25 of the recipients.

Garden City KDLO tower continues to see progress

In December 2022, the 1,705-foot KDLO tower in Garden City collapsed during a winter storm. The collapse was caused by ice accumulation. The second 800-foot tower followed the first only a few hours later.

In September 2023, construction of a new tower began. Precision Communications, an Oklahoma-based company, was hired to install the new KDLO-TV tower in Garden City.
