Marlin Fjelland is a new member of the South Dakota Auctioneers Hall of Fame

Marlin Fjelland of Clark was inducted into the South Dakota Auctioneers Association (SDAA) Hall of Fame during the annual convention held this June in Watertown. Also inducted into the Hall of Fame was Terry Haiar of Alexandria.

Fjelland has conducted auctions in northeastern South Dakota since 1969. He reports that his interest dates back to his age of 10 when he remembers selling and re-selling his kid brother many times over as a cow, pig, sheep or horse. Fjelland shared his auctioneering philosophy in a previous *Courier* story when he was president of SDAA in 2004-2005: "There is much more to auctioneering than calling a sale, e.g., meeting with the potential seller, looking over the property/real estate and listing it, developing a selling and advertising/marketing plan and carrying it out, assisting in proper arrangement of sale items, after-sale bookwork, handling vehicle titles, and dispersing the funds to the seller".

"I am very proud to be associated with many fine South Dakota Auctioneers including long-time partners Terry Schlagel and Harley Lamb of Clark. I feel that South Dakota auctioneers have represented the industry with professionalism, integrity and dedication-all basic tenets of the SD members of the association," said Fjelland.

A long-time member of the SDAA, Fjelland has attended every annual meeting since he became a member. He has also maintained active membership in the National Auctioneers Association since 1966. He has been a member of the National President's Council, helped engineer SDAA incorporation, and helped establish and served as co-chair and chair of the SD 4-H Foundation Benefit Auction at each

Rainfall brings relief-and smiles


After a dry stretch of over a month, from one and one-quarter inches to nearly three inches of rain fell throughout the county last week, most of it early on Sunday.
