



Circuit Court Judge Carmen Means, in a conference call with Crocker Wind Farm attorneys, set Monday, August 14, at 10:30 a.m. as to when this matter is scheduled for hearing by the court. The briefing schedule is to be worked out through the respective attorneys prior to Aug. 14.

The Board conditioned its decision to grant the permit with 3/4 of a mile for wind towers from existing off-site non-participating residences, which setbacks are grossly in excess of those required in the zoning ordinance. The zoning ordinance requires wind towers to simply be more than 1,000 feet from residences. The Board failed to follow the Clark County zoning ordinance for WES in this respect. Fixing the Horace Bennett Memorial Swimming Pool and the upcoming completion of the freshwater retention pond, southeast of Clark, were the two water related topics taking much attention at city

The Horace Bennett Memorial Swimming Pool was constructed in the late 1950s with a large renovation taking place in the 1980s, but little repair work, or upgrades have happened in the last 30 years and the pool needs both repair and up-

Mayor John Pollock stated that
