Even at 107 years old, Hazel continues to celebrate her proud Norwegian roots. A 13-year resident of Clark's Roetell Senior Housing, in recent years she's helped make lefse for residents and staff, and oyster stew on Christmas Eve. Her birthday is even on May 17th, a national holiday in Norway, known as Constitution Day.

A first generation American, Hazel was born in 1915 to Andrew and Marie Christopherson on the famione of 7 children, who all grew up working on the farm. When asked recently about the secret to her longevity, she told her granddaughters that she was "never babied."

Hazel has spent her entire life as a resident of Clark County. She married her husband, Clarence Ness, at the Lutheran parsonage in Clark on February 2, 1934. The couple was blessed with two children: Clayton Allen born in 1935, and Dianne Marie, born in 1940. The family farmed in Foxton and Merton Township until 1956, when they moved to Clark.

Hazel worked as a custodian at the local St. Paul Lutheran Church and at different restaurants. She also worked at a local dance hall selling tickets, while her husband son, Clayton and his family still worked as a bouncer. Hazel liked to travel from Oklahoma to see her

Dakotans have been inducted into the Century Club since its founding in 1997. The Century Club is, as its name states, a club. Therefore, there may be older people in the state that have not yet been inducted by a family member or loved one into the Century Club.

The Century Club is open to any resident of South Dakota upon the celebration of his or her 100th birthday. There are no dues and each inductee receives a specially designed certificate and membership card. Potato Days, 2022 is a little over two weeks away! Make sure you put down August 5, 6 and 7 on your cal-



The Clark County Fairgrounds will be the site of the 21st annual Clark County 4-H Rodeo on Saturday and Sunday, July 23 and 24. The rodeo events will begin at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday and at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday.

Over 200 contestants have signed up to take part in the two day event. Events for junior and senior contestants are planned in both the small and large arenas at the rodeo grounds.

The rodeo event order for both days at the large arena includes: senior barrels, junior barrels, junior-junior barrels, senior steer wrestling, senior dally team roping, junior flag race, junior-junior flag race, senior pole bending, senior bareback riding, senior saddle bronc riding, junior cattle riding, senior bull riding.

In the small arena, the event order is: senior calf roping, junior boys breakaway, senior breakaway, junior boys goat tying, junior girls breakaway, senior ribbon roping, junior girls goat tying, senior girls goat tying, junior pole bending. Concession stand will be available on grounds.

The prime purpose of the meeting was to sit as a Board of Adjustment and decide upon the Conditional Use Permit brought forth by 3J's automated car wash, to be located on the east end of Clark. The

South Dakota churches suffering decline in affiliation and attendance

Anyone who attends church in South Dakota is probably already aware of a troubling trend afflicting religious organizations and churches across the state and nation: the slow but steady decline in church membership and attendance.

It may be fewer cars in the parking lot, fewer people in the pews or fewer volunteers at charitable outings. It might be a pastor or priest who serves more than one congregation or is in a temporary post as a fill-in. It could also be the closure of a local church or growing concerns that closure could be imminent.

Those are some of the outward signs of what religious leaders and experts say is a dramatic decline in religious affiliation and church attendance that began in the late 20th century, picked up pace during the COVID-19 pandemic, and remains a growing cause for concern in the post-pandemic era.

Membership in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, one of the largest churches in South Dakota, is down 40% over the past 30 years nationally and has fallen by almost 10% in South Dakota over roughly the past decade. At-

tendance at Lutheran churches in South Dakota is down about 14% since 2013, and the ELCA recently closed churches in Newell and Bradley, S.D.

Catholic and Methodist churches are also seeing declines. In the Sioux Falls Catholic Diocese, which serves all of East River South Dakota, records indicate that church attendance in 2022 is down 26% compared with 2010 and that membership has also fallen.

The decrease in church affiliation and attendance follows other patterns that show Americans are turning away from organized religion and many of its tenets. Surveys show that among Americans, belief in God is lower than ever; that trust in religion is way down; and that fewer people believe the Bible to be the true word of God and instead see it as a book of only

fables or legends. Perhaps most worrisome for church leaders in America and South Dakota is that in recent surveys, the people who do not affiliate with any religion, the so-called "nones," are the fastest-growing segment of the national population as indicated in surveys about religion, faith and beliefs.
