Despite the challenges posed by heavy rain, work on the courts, which began in mid-June, will be completed in time for the first tournament, scheduled for Sunday, August 4, following Clark's Potato

# Law enforcement respond to stabbing in Clark on Sunday

On Sunday, July 21, at ap- into custody. proximately 2:33 p.m., Watertown Regional 911 center received a 911 call of a stabbing that occurred in the 400 block of First Avenue West in Clark.

Law enforcement arrived on the scene and began tending to the victim along with gathering information on the suspect that had fled the scene. Law enforcement was able to gain a description of the vehicle that the suspect fled in. Law enforcement in Codington County was able to make a traffic stop on the vehicle in question and were able to take the suspect, Edgard Uriel Jarquin Cruz,

The suspect was charged with aggravated assault and is being held in the Codington County Detention Center. The victim was transported to an area hospital where they were treated and released.

The investigation is ongoing. The Clark Police Department is being assisted by the Clark County Sheriff's Office, Codington County Sheriff's Office, South Dakota Highway Patrol, South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks, Watertown Police Department, South Dakota Division of Criminal Investigation and Clark County Ambulance.



# **Anna Hamre is Valley Music** Hall of Fame 2024 inductee

Anna Hamre is one of the five esteemed 2024 inductees into the Valley Music Hall of Fame in Fresno, Calif. Her parents were Melvin and Ruth Hamre of Clark. She is Professor Emerita and former Director of Choral Activities at Fresno State, serves as Artistic Director of Fresno Community Chorus, Inc. and has received numerous awards in choral conducting and music education.

Dr. Hamre took over the Fresno Community Chorus in 2002. Dedicated to its motto "Giving Voice to the Central Valley," it sponsors five ensembles: Fresno Master Chorale, Coro Piccolo, Coro Solare, Quintus, and Altissima

These ensembles comprise a diverse group of volunteer singers from various professions. Under Dr. Hamre's leadership, the Fresno Master Chorale tours regularly in Europe and Asia and has performed multiple times at Carnegie Hall.

Hamre is the author of The High School/University Sight-Singer and The Weekly Sight-Singer: An Abbreviated and Accelerated Method both used widely in music education.

Dr. Hamre has conducted her groups in numerous countries and has guest engagements as a conductor, adjudicator, clinician and presenter, including two Carnegie Hall appearances. She holds degrees from Augustana College, University of Northern Colorado and University of Colorado in Boulder.

Other 2024 inductees include John Clifton, John Chookasian, Marisa Orduno and Evo Bluestein.

The Valley Music Hall of Fame is a non-profit organization dedicated to recognizing and celebrating individuals who have significantly contributed to our local music scene.
