
In the photos to the left and above, two cowboys were photgraphed in action during their saddle bronc and cattle riding events during the Saturday portion of competition.

After 36 year drought, CWL legion team advances to state tournament

After 36 years without a state tournament appearance, the Clark-Willow Lake Cagley-Smith Post #60 Legion Baseball team punched their ticket to the South Dakota State B Legion baseball tournament after qualifying Thursday, July 20 in the South Dakota American Legion Region 6B tournament in Northville.

The Senators defeated the Faulkton-Highmore Hitmen in the opening round of play Tuesday, July 18 and continued their winning streak with a victory over Warner-Ipswich-Northwestern later that evening. Wednesday, Clark-Willow Lake was defeated by Redfield Post #92 before beating Warner-Ipswich-Northwestern (W-I-N) once again on Thursday to advance to the championship

game versus Redfield for the second time in the tournament that evening. Redfield was victorious, with Clark-Willow Lake bringing home second place honors in the tournament.

It has been since 36 years since the legion baseball team from the Clark community has made an appearance at a state tournament. In 1987, the Clark Legion team that was coached by Jim Bjerke played their way through the loser's bracket to capture the South Dakota state B title over Sissteton. The class B tournament was held in Wagner, S.D. in 1987.

In that era, there was a State A and State B tournament, crowning champions from each class. Those teams then clashed for a "big game" state championship. Clark lost to Rapid City and Brookings,

the big prize, but they finished the season with a State B Legion title. Team members of the Cagley-Smith Legion Post #60 American Legion team in 1987 were Jay Baldwin, Joel Brekke, Tom Grode, Don Sharp, Ken Harding, Brian Seefeldt, Chad Espeland, Troy Anderson, Todd Anderson, Jay Tschetter, Paul Florey, Jeff Bjerke,

Mark Lane and Jake Obermeier. This year's team has a bit of a fairytale story going into the state tournament, as they had a losing record going into region play.

Brock Greenfield, who has helped coach this Legion team over the past several years, commented, "Our Legion team is very young, but they add to a solid nucleus of veteran leadership. Only

four of our regular starters are

running out of magic to bring home actual Legion-aged, those being Lucas Kannegieter, Trey Huber, Jack Bratland and Mitchell Larson. The team is rounded up with solid members of our 16U and 14U

> Greenfield added, "Our younger kids have really elevated their game as the year has gone on. On the first day of the regional tourney, we had three 16U pitchers turn in stellar performances for us. Dawson Lantgen and Cooper Pommer threw sixand-two-thirds innings in the first game, with Huber recording the final out to hammer down the save against Faulkton-Highmore. In game two, Josh Kannegieter threw three innings, only surrendering one earned run before giving way to Lucas (Kannegieter), then Jack
