Fireworks will take to the sky at dusk come Thursday night for Clark's 4th of July celebration.

The City of Clark, along with the Clark Chamber of Commerce, Clark Lions and Clark Rotary Club, will make the fireworks display event again a reality and it will take place at dusk at the Clark Golf Course.

Color certainly adds

Needful of heat units is the common theme of the immediate 2013 growing season as the 4th of July is upon us, summer's mythical half way point.

"I'm guessing one will find a whole lot of knee-high corn in Clark County," said agronomy specialist Mark Rosenberg of the Aberdeen Extension Regional Center. "This should be a pretty good catch-up week."

Corn being knee-high by the Fourth of July in Clark County has been the norm for some time now and 2013 will have most fields with knee-high corn.

"We're coming off a week of pretty rough weather," noted the agronomy specialist. "There were some severe hail events during the last storm and Clark County, especially the southern third of the county suffered hail damage. The rain that accompanied the wind and hail a week ago Friday and Saturday was plentiful and widespread."

Because of a late spring and cooler than normal temperatures, Rosenberg reported that row crops are lagging two to three weeks behind. "We need heat to propel the growth, although some acres are catching up," he said. "This lagging behind is showing up in the countryside. Weed control has dragged out and the grow season has started in somewhat of a stall and needs to pick up and go."

The July weather will be key, noted Rosenberg, and he added that typically July into early August is hot and dry and that is what is

"Because most crashes are entirely preventable, wearing seatbelts, following speed limits and avoiding distractions while driving can go a long way to making the highways safer for all of us this holiday."

Myra Cluts of Vienna was appreciated by many last Friday as it was her last day as the community Post Office manager in Vienna. It was also the last day as a working Vienna Post Office with its official closing on June 28, 2013

Since purchasing the former Omar Aice Grocery Store in 1985, Myra has remodeled and turned it into a very welcoming place to come for the Vienna community residents. Besides picking up the mail, many have gathered to 'shoot the breeze' over the years, keeping up with what's going on in their small town and the surrounding area.

"Today's the day...I'm done," says Myra Cluts with a chuckle regarding the end of her longtime commitment to the Vienna Post Office on Friday.

Passing the average retirement age a couple decades ago, Cluts has been going strong the last 28 years as Vienna's Community Post Office manager.

A representative of the U.S. Postal service arrived on Friday morning to collect the scales, the sorting table, various records and other items, as the Vienna Post Office was officially closed as of Friday, June 28, 2013.

An open house was held with many in attendance to show their appreciation on that final day. Bouquet after bouquet of flowers came in the door for Myra along with many gifts and cards that morning

as the regulars who came in the door greeted their hostess of the last 28 years.

More than a post office, it has been a gathering place for area residents to come and 'catch up' with one another over the years. "The coffee pot was always on," said Cluts. "I'm not planning on going anywhere. Vienna is my home as it has been for the last 50 years. I'm not planning on selling this building.'

The Vienna Post Office has been under the official management of the Willow Lake Post Office and Postmaster Kathy LaBay. LaBay adds, "There is interest in a village post office, but it has yet to be finalized within the system, and they are checking into it."

"It's been most wonderful working with Kathy LaBay," states Cluts. "She's been awesome to work

whenever I needed her to fill in for me when I needed to keep an appointment."

Vrondran also calls Vienna home, being born and raised southeast of town. "It's been fun helping her out now and then when she needed me," returns Vrondran.

Cluts purchased the building in 1985, the same year as the town's 100th anniversary she said. It was formerly a grocery store. For the last 28 years, Cluts has had the post office under contract with the U. S. Postal service. Running the businesses previously were Basil and Rita Englert, Norris and Phyllis Hanson and Bill and Leona Mellam. Gary Owen was the last official Postmaster in Vienna.

Don Berg was the Willow Lake Postmaster who hired Cluts. Mike Korbel was Postmaster after Berg and LaBay took over after Mike's retirement as Willow Lake's postmaster.

After purchasing the building in 1985, Cluts remodeled the building to be a post office only, but added tables for area residents to gather in a very home like atmosphere. She remembers the Post Office being in the bank building in Vienna in her early years in Vienna.

Cluts came to the community 50 plus years ago after her marriage to Gordon Cluts in November of 1962.

Myra grew up in Watertown, the daughter of Elmer and Lillian (Schutt) Dougherty. She had one brother Robert.

She graduated from Watertown High School with the class of 1946. Following graduation, she worked at Gowan's Photo Shop in Water-Cluts (continued on page 9)

Sunday was a benchmark day in the life of Kim Kaufman. Kaufman, a 2009 Clark High School graduate and 2013 Texas Tech University graduate, won her first professional title, on the Symetra Tour.

Kaufman won the Island Resort Championship in Harris, Mich. on Sunday, beating Japan's Mitsuki Katahira with a two-putt par on the first hole of a playoff. She made 20-foot birdie putts on the final two holes in regulation for a 4-under 68 to match Katahira at 3-under 213 on the Sweetgrass course.

Kaufman won in her third start on the tour. She jumped from 60th



to ninth on the money list with the final top 10 earning 2013 LPGA Tour cards.
