The 2022 Clark County 4-H Achievement Days were held August 1, 2, and 3. A total of 588 exhibits were shown by Clark County 4-Her's.

Monday morning started off with display exhibit judging. There were 413 total exhibits entered and on display at the Home Ec building this year. Purple ribbons this year numbered 310. Entries within the various project areas varied: Foods and Food Preservation had 48 exhibits; Clothing had 27 exhibits;

A total of 98 exhibits were entered for Visual Arts. Horticulture exhibits totaled eight exhibits. There were 54 photography entries.

This year we had many clover buds also bring exhibits. Clover bud projects are not counted in our ribbon counts, instead the clover bud receives a clover bud ribbon for each of their projects after visiting with the judge. Clover buds are 4-H members ages 5-7.

Dacotah Bank Field is a youth diamond of community pride

As the summer recreation youth baseball/softball seasons have come to an end, the facility has received many upgrades, including naming rights.

Located just south of the high/ middle school, Dacotah Bank Field is a baseball/softball diamond, with concession stand that really shines with community pride.

Westside Implement owner Kyle Gaikowksi has been the leading force behind this field and concession stand improvements.

"Community support has been huge for the success of this park project. We have a field that all of us and our kids can be proud of," said Gaikowski.

He went to two city and two school board meetings with an idea of a few things that needed improvements on at the youth field. The baseball/softball association had \$12,500 at that time.

"When the meeting minutes came out in the paper, local sponsors came to me with donations, Implement.

Brandon Herr, Clark Community Oil general manager Troy Grensberg,

Westside Implement owner Kyle Gaikowski and Erin Heiman of Westside

adding \$62,500 to the fund. The project went from a patch job to get us by, to a full facelift to revitalize the ballpark that had not seen much attention since it was built in the 80's."

"Next projects with future monies include painting the inside of the bathrooms and concessions area, Epoxy the concrete floors, redo plumbing and fixtures and sinks, aluminum bleachers, trees for shade and aesthetics, walk door repair, trim trees and level the

rough outfield," said the Westside owner. The field is used for baseball ages five to 12 and softball youth through high school ages. Approximately 180 kids utilized the field for practices and games this summer. The outfield back fence and in-

field grading was done in partnership between Geronimo Energy and Wanzek Construction in 2019. In 2020, Westside Implement moved

Clark school board readies for 2022-2023 start

The August meeting of the Clark School Board reflected that school hadn't been in session the last three months, but is a week away from starting anew.

Routine business included tweaking existing policies and updating elementary, middle school and high school handbooks.

Two new policy drafts were discussed and will be voted on at the September meeting.

The first handbook policy change item dealt with meal charge policy. It is required by the federal government.

In a nutshell, this policy states: To help establish consistent meal account procedures throughout the district. Unpaid charges place a financial strain on the food service department. The goals of this standard of practice are:

• To treat all students with dignity in the serving line regarding meal accounts.

• To support positive situations with district staff, district business policies, student and parent/guard-
