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Once again success reigns at Clark County 4-H Achievement Days

The 2019 Clark County 4-H Achievement Days were held August 5, 6, 7 and 8. A total of 892 exhibits were shown by Clark County 4-Her's.

"I kind of like going to a four-day Achievement Days format," said Clark County 4-H advisor Kim Mc-Graw. "Our dog show on Monday, didn't feel rushed and the week moved along quite nicely."

McGraw noted that beautiful August weather really helped bring out a nice crowd for Achievement "The weather cooperated Days. nicely. Not too hot and the wind was just a breeze for most of the week."

Monday evening started Achievement Days off with the Dog Show. This year eight 4-Her's and their dogs participated in three events, Obedience, Showmanship and Agility. Obedience had 4-Her's participating in four different levels of difficulty. Champion in the novice level went to Lane Tarbox and Belle, Champion pre-novice was Aanya Fuller and Chloe. Champion in the basic B level went to Sara Thonvold and Harleigh, while basic A champion was Shawna Thonvold and Roxie. In showmanship the junior winner was Ignatius Fuller and the champion Beginner winner was Shawna Thonvold. Four 4-Her's participated in Agility. The champion agility went to Sara Thonvold.

Tuesday static exhibits were judged. Static exhibits had 628 total exhibits entered and on display in the Home Ec Building this year for Achievement Days. There were 530 purples awarded.

Within the project areas entries varied: Food and Nutrition and Food Preservation had 42 total entries with 42 purple ribbons awarded. Container Gardens had 13 exhibits with all receiving purples. Clothing had 40 entries with 40 purples; Home Environment had 97 entries with 92 purple ribbons awarded. A total of 125 exhibits were entered in the Visual Arts division with 105 purple ribbons awarded. Six entries were made in the Crops Division with five purples and 16 horticulture exhibits with 13 purples. Thirteen entries were made in Wood Science with 11 purples. There were 163 photography entries this year and 127 purple ribbons were awarded. First Aid projects totaled 22 exhibits with 22 receiving purple ribbons. Hobbies & Collections had 27 entries with 25 purples. This year there were 64 miscellaneous projects entered. Miscellaneous project areas include: graphic design, electricity, poultry & eggs, welding, child development and educational posters and displays, wildlife and fisheries.

This year there were approximately 12 4-H Cloverbuds who brought exhibits. Cloverbud projects are not counted in the normal ribbon counts. Cloverbuds are 4-H members ages 5-7, who receive their own Cloverbud ribbon. It is estimated 75 Cloverbud exhibits could be viewed at the Cloverbud booth in the Static Exhibit building during this year's Achievement Days



Getting ready for the new school year was the underlying theme of the August meeting of the Clark School Board, held Monday evening at the high school library.

August is the month also when the board finalizes the respective handbooks for the new school term. The policy changes were not major in scope but rather changing of terminology and minor tweaks.

Technology coordinator Sam Williams was in attendance and he covered the basic charges for laptops/ tablets. High school students will be allowed to take computers home this year and he had cost numbers

for screen replacement, lost chargers and lost computers.

Superintendent/principal Luanne Warren explained a policy change for requiring faculty to keep their lunch bill under \$50. Another change is that Veteran's Day is not a holiday but the Friday after Thanksgiving is considered a holiday.

As far as "housekeeping" high school policy changes, a tardy will be in effect after the doors have been locked. The elementary also does it this way.

Cell phone policy will no longer include expulsion, probably, ex-

plained Warren and she specified what would happen with multiple offenses.

Lockers are school property and can be checked at any time, it was noted. Parking lot policies were also discussed.

The biggest policy change will be that middle school teachers are in favor of summer school to help failing middle school students. What happens now is that if a high school freshman fails a class, it needs to be repeated. Middle school instruc-
