### El Corral to open in Clark in next three weeks

Authentic Mexican food is coming to Clark! And it will be a blend of offerings from both the southern and northern parts of Mexico with dishes that reflect their traditions.

The two families that have partnered to buy the former DB BBQ building, along U.S. Highway 212 on the west side of Clark, are Ismael and Diana Cruz and Ivan and Teresa Regalado.

Hopefully if construction goes as planned, 'El Corral' with its cocina Mexicana (meaning Mexican kitchen in Spanish) will be open for business by the first week in September. "It's going to be good!" stated co-owner Ismael. It's a good combination with the partners having different recipes and different dishes.

"We love to cook - it's our family time together," stated Ismael. "It's been a family dream to open a restaurant since we moved here in 2006."

Ismael and Ivan both work for Riverview at the Raymond location and plan on keeping these positions while their wives will be the cooks at El Corral. The feedlot is now under construction to become a dairy. Having grown up in central Mexico, Ismael later moved north after marriage and lived in Tamaulipas.

marriage and lived in Tamaulipas. He's spent the last 20 years working with cattle in the feedlots.

Diana Garcia Cruz is an experienced cook who most recently worked in a Redfield nursing home in the kitchen. Diana and Ismael have two sons, Alex and Orlando.

Diana's sister Brenda Garcia and her sons Diego and Ernesto have also moved to the area from Sheldon, Iowa, to help with this venture. Brenda and Diana both have a lot of experience in the kitchen with food preparation.

Ivan's wife Teresa will also be a cook in the business with her expertise in specialty Mexican ice cream and syrups. Fruit infused waters and ice pops made with fruit juices and real fruit such as strawberry, kiwi and mango are what she's excited to bring to the business.

### <u>Clark School inservice</u> Jeff Gould gives encouragement presentation during these pandemic times

"You have the ability this year to teach children about life, resilience, hope and courage," stated Jeff Gould at last Wednesday's teacher inservice training at the Clark School.

Jeff Gould, a broadcaster, author and eulogist from Sioux Falls is an experienced communicator who uses story telling to guide and encourage people to live with meaning, balance and purpose.

His talk on Wednesday gave the teachers options and advice on dealing with the fears and anxieties out there due to this year's pandemic situation.

In his presentation, his first slide show photo was of a roller coaster. "This right here - this is the 'right now' for us. What a roller coaster ride we've been on this year."

"That click, click, click sound as you go up before you reach the top and then the drastic fall, that's what it feels like now. It's a nervous experience.

"A third of us are riding this roller coaster to the top in limbo, as we don't know what's going on from one day to the next. Sports - not sports, etc., things change and every day it seems there is a new thing to make you anxious.

"Another third of us are frantic trying to keep up with new demands. There are so many shortages now, from construction lumber to white thread and even bullets.

"The other third have no job now, especially in the restaurants counting on the social interactions of their customers. The ag industry is suffering.

"Anxiety is felt by everybody," he continued. "When will this be over? What can be done?

"You are the help these kids are looking for. The training you have is what the kids need. You are the

### teacher and care about your kids." Harrisburg shooter story

Gould used an example of kids feeling safe under their teacher's care when describing the Harrisburg shooter in the school several years ago. His wife and daughter were in the school that day - in the choir room and in class. The crisis was soon over leaving one principal shot in the arm and Gould was asked by his wife Libby to come and pick up their teenaged daughter. He pondered on the drive there on what he should say when he picked her up. He went the calm and reassuring route and his words were "It's over. Things are fine. What do you want for lunch?"

He also saw a frantic, hysterical parent come out of her car to look

for her daughter. The daughter was fine until she saw her mother freaking out and then she did, too.

"I watched my daughter then
