Small grain harvest continues; row crops progressing slowly

The rain received late last week was very beneficial to all crops, as moisture was needed and all of the area received at least an inch of rain, or thereabouts, this past

"Both the soybeans and the corn are looking good and moving along and a month ago we said we needed a mixture of heat and moisture. We received the moisture, so now we really need the heat units," Kim McGraw, the Clark County 4-H activities program director, said.

McGraw, the former Clark County ag educator was being interviewed about the State Fair, but didn't feel out of line commenting on how the county needs warm weather to get the crop to maturity.

"We still want a cool State Fair week," McGraw jested, but continued that growing degree days are still needed, as we have had a fairly cool, comfortable summer.

State Fair

The South Dakota State Fair seems early this year and it is. All but two days of the fair will be in August. The State Fair 2014 runs from August 28 through September 2.

McGraw said her office has pre-registered and entered all eligible livestock. "A lot of Clark County exhibits are going to the State Fair this year," she said. "Clark County 4-H does very well each year at the fair. We have high quality livestock and very good static exhibits."




The hay crop has been deemed above average this summer in Clark County, and it seems as if we need rain in the county, just put some hay on the ground. Whether or not that was the case,

Jeff Olson, at Clark County Farmers Elevator said the small grain crop is 'pretty decent'. "Winter wheat came in at 65-90 bushels an acre, and the winter wheat harvest is pretty much done," said Olson. "As far as the spring wheat, the yields are pret-

A drainage project on 5th Ave. N. E. in Clark is nearing completion. This project has been talked about and planned for some time and city of Clark road superintendent Roger Collins said that it will be entirely done within the month, weather permitting.

Located between N. Cloud St. and N. Kansas St., Collins stated that the ditches have been sloped and a valley (concrete) gutter is now in place.

"The ditches were so uneven and the water would

pool," stated Collins. "Now it gets in the valley gutter and it's gone."
