Cyclone football 2024 season preview

Clark-Willow Lake returns a core nucleus of toughness that will translate into pay dirt in the red zone for the 2024 campaign. After finishing with a 3-5 record in 2023 with key wins against Webster Area, Mobridge-Pollock and Dakota Hills, the Cyclones are back on the grid iron, and they are hungry for much more.

The Cyclones just conquered fall camp and according to Head Coach David Severson, "The boys showed up with a great attitude and have worked hard at getting better every

Coach Severson has set the tone for the season early, and the bar of expectation has been elevated. "Our team goals and expectations for this group of young men is quite high. We have a goal of playoff caliber

Clark-Willow Lake returns four seniors this fall in Elliot Bratland, Josh Kannegieter, Chris Venjohn and Griffin Musser, and they have added two more, including Zane Werdel and Parker Schmidt to create a super six.

"Zane and Parker joined the team this year for their senior year," adds Coach Severson. "They are great additions to the team. The other four seniors have had big roles in this team since their freshman year. I have great expectations for these seniors this year."

The Cyclones need not look far for leadership and field experience. "Three of our four captains this year were also captains last year. Quite a few of these juniors and seniors have been in leadership positions before. I feel this year we have the leadership to accomplish the weekly goals for the team to be successful on Friday nights. It starts in practice, and I feel we have the guys in place that are willing to meet that responsibility every day," states

Coach Severson.

Key contributors can also readily be found in the trio of Musser, Kannegieter and Bratland.

"Griffin Musser has been our leading offensive player for the last two seasons and will be expected to lead our offensive battle this year," adds Coach Severson. "Elliot Bratland has also been our leading tackler the last two seasons and will be an anchor in defense. Josh Kannegieter is as sound of a player on both sides of the ball as they come. These seniors will be daunted with the task of leading this team every Friday night," Severson explains.

Newcomers will add some spice and athleticism to an already gritty Cyclone core. "We have some up and coming talent coming that will see the field quite a bit," says Coach

Severson adds, "Talen Huber comes in as a sophomore, and we will look to make an impact with him where he is needed. Diego Garcia and Ernesto Garcia are juniors and will both be starting this year. Damian Severson and Cooper Pommer will look to make a big impact in our DB/WR category this season. Jakob Steen has made the move to Guard and will be asked to fill some big roles for us up front. He is an intense player, and that is perfect for the guard position. Mato Desnoyer and Seth Poppen will also be on the line utilizing their strength. Masyn Knock and Michael Severson have seen quite a bit of playing time last year and will be asked to anchor the remainder of the line."

In 2024, the Cyclones have reflected upon key personnel and will make adaptations utilizing the talent and skill they already possess.

According to Coach Severson, 'We have adapted to the game, our play style will be a lot different than it has been in the past offensively,

but we feel it is going to utilize the guys we have."

Key improvements from last year include finishing drives by converting in the red zone.

"We have taken some great steps in trying to improve our Red-Zone offense and utilizing the talent that we have," adds Coach Severson. "We have focused a lot of our off-season and fall camp on scoring the football. It was our downfall last year crossing the goal line, so the coaching staff is putting great pressure on the boys to rise up and finish the drive with points."

The Clark-Willow Lake Cyclones will open their 2024 campaign hosting Aberdeen Roncalli on August 23

at Clark High School. 'We start the season with Aberdeen Roncalli. They will be one, if not the toughest opponents on our schedule. We are excited about this, because we lost a heart-breaker to them by five points last season, and our guys are looking to get our turn this year."

Raymond Redwing Days set for Saturday

Nestled north of 212 between Clark and Doland, a little red-andwhite water tower stands over a small cluster of homes. The name on the tower in black is Raymond.

In the last census, Raymond's population was shrinking to a mere 50 residents, primarily alums from the Raymond School that closed in the 1970s. Raymond residents feared their home would fade into history and fuzzy memories like the school, restaurants, gazette, bank and lumber yard.

Then, houses began to sell. Young couples started to call Raymond their home, and now the streets and driveways are full of bikes and strollers. The park got a facelift with new equipment, and The Raymond Station opened. The town is buzzing under its little redroofed water tower. Kids laughing and playing now fill the once-quiet streets

The Redwing Days event was initiated by both new and existing residents to celebrate their community. What started as a small gathering with music, food and neighbors has rapidly turned into something larg-

The event, named after the school mascot, The Redwing, will kick off with a color run/walk exploring the town. While the 5k is taking place, a tractor show and vendor fair will be set up near the U.S. Post Office. Additionally, there will be inflatables and a barrel train for kids to enjoy.

Recognizing that there are almost 20 kids in town, Raymond Redwing Days aims to offer activities for the whole family. At 10:00 a.m., the Farmer's Market will open, along with the Kids' Treasure Trove dig in the park, the Potato Launch and Ripley Acres Petting Zoo. Throughout the day, the Ryamond Fire Department will be

serving breakfast, lunch and supper along with drinks for the visitors. After lunch, families can join in a game of bingo at the Raymond America Legion building, followed by Dilly Bars with a Deputy. Later on, everyone can participate in the Barnyard Competitions, including the Goat Grab and a Pig Scramble for both kids and adults.

But, that's just the first half of the day's schedule. Afternoon activities include a bean bag tournament at 3:00 p.m., a Cajun Boil at Raymond Station at 4:00 p.m., Chicken Sh!t Bingo at 5:00 p.m., silent auction at 6:00 p.m., the If It Rolls Parade at 7:00 p.m. and the Lizzy Hofer Band starting at 8:00 p.m.

All proceeds from the event will go towards community improvements in Raymond and to fund next year's Raymond Redwing Days
