Federal Reserve Bank hosts listening session in Clark Kokodoko explained, as he began

A listening session focused on changes in retail banking in rural communities was held last Tuesday, at the Ullyot Building, in Clark.

The Community Development Department of the Federal Reserve Bank, in partnership with South Dakota State University Extension Service and Dacotah Bank, were

Over 30 local interested individuals were in attendance as were Clark Kotary Club members.

The purpose of the meeting, stated by Karla Trautman, interim director for SDSU's Extension Service, "We wanted to hear from retail and business customers, business owners and other community residents. This session's intention is to help build a report in support of the national dialogue about banking trends and changes."

The facilitator of the listening session was Michou Kokodoko, project director for the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis. He was assisted by Ben Horowitz.

the listening session, that the Federal Reserve Bank is conducting a series of listening sessions to learn what are the financial needs and how life has changed in the wake of bank branch closings. Said Kokodoko, "We have these meetings to hear about personal experiences so we can better understand the real impacts of bank closures and other banking changes on rural communities and residents.

Clark County is a sparsely populated county, with approximately 3,000 residents, with the county seat of Clark having approximately 1,000 residents, he said. "Several banks have closed," said Kokodoko and then his first question was, "Can you describe what financial services are needed?"

As this was a listening session, many in the audience volunteered many thoughts in the next hour, including land, line of credit and
