'We've let the cat out of the bag," joked author Bob Christenson of his new book Clark Stories.



The book, written by former Clark resident Bob Christenson, is a collection of personal stories over the years that he has collected from his classmates, friends and family of life in Clark in years passed. Christenson currently lives in Sioux Falls with his wife KrisAnne where he's practiced law at Christenson Law since 1985. Christenson is a 1968 graduate of Clark High School.

The year 1968 was dubbed by Time magazine as 'The Year That Shaped a Generation". Hippies, assassinations, the Vietnam War and protests, dress code changes and changes in attitudes were experienced in the 1960s.

#### Skip Day 1968

A protest took place at Clark High School in 1968 on Easter Monday in the form of a walkout followed by a picnic near Willow Lake while police were searching west and east of town for the hooky-playing students. 'Skip Day' was the brainchild

of Margie Lura's mother Irene who put the idea in her daughter's head. Margie and her co-horts Peggy Heig and Peggy Bruflat soon began the secretive plan of reclaiming their Easter Monday vacation. The vacation day was taken due to a snow day that year. All seniors went to school that day but soon after arriving jumped in their get away cars and headed south and west.

A fake drivers license and hot dogs on the grill were involved before the picnic at a lake. Word soon spread that all involved (54 seniors out of 67 and some juniors and sophomores) were now expelled and a parent needed to come to school the next day to talk to then principal - Bud Elkins, before their unexcused child could return to school.

Charlie Wagner recalled standing in the long line of parents with his father outside the school that morning. "I heard dad start talking with other dads recollecting the mischief of their school days and thought to myself that things would probably turn out okay that day."

Margie (Lura) Rolfing recalled hearing how her mother was called about her daughter's absence and replied "I know. I gave her the

"I'm happy every day," stated Kai Moromikawa of his experience so far in being a part of the Willow Lake community and a junior at Willow Lake High School.

The 16 year old who will turn 17 on November 14, arrived in August and is spending this school year in the home of Chance and Melissa Burke. The Burkes have three children, Chance Jaden, Mikenna and

"It was 24 hours of traveling for Kai to get here," said Melissa Burke of her exchange son for the 2018-2019 school year. "He's finding out how when one lives here you drive every where to go to events. Where Kai lives in Okinawa, Japan, he takes the bus to school and is there in 15 minutes." Taking the train, bus or riding bike is common transportation in Japan. One must be 19 years old to get a drivers license in Japan noted Moromikawa who also added that 'driving is scary' where he lives with so much heavy traffic in tighter spaces.

Our wide open spaces with a lot

of farmland is one of the first things he noticed after arriving to Clark County. "Less crowded" is something he is enjoying while here.

Kai is the son of Osamu and Chisako Moromikawa. Both of his parents work for the Oceans Hotel in management. He has one brother Kou who attends Nagasaki University and is 19 years old.
